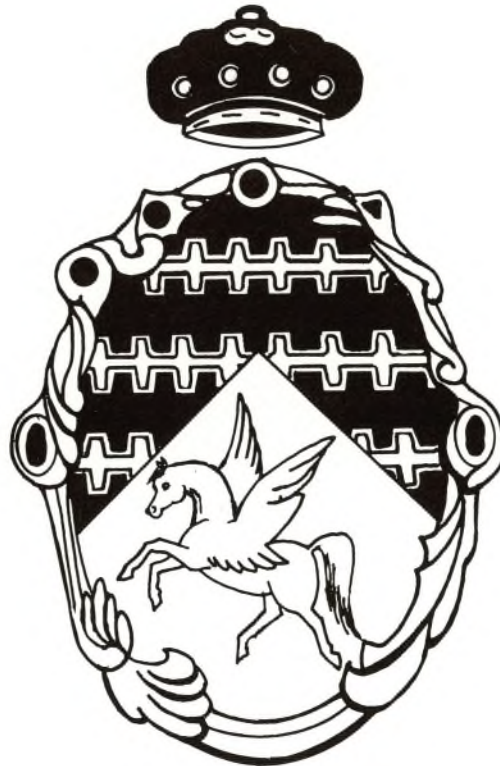

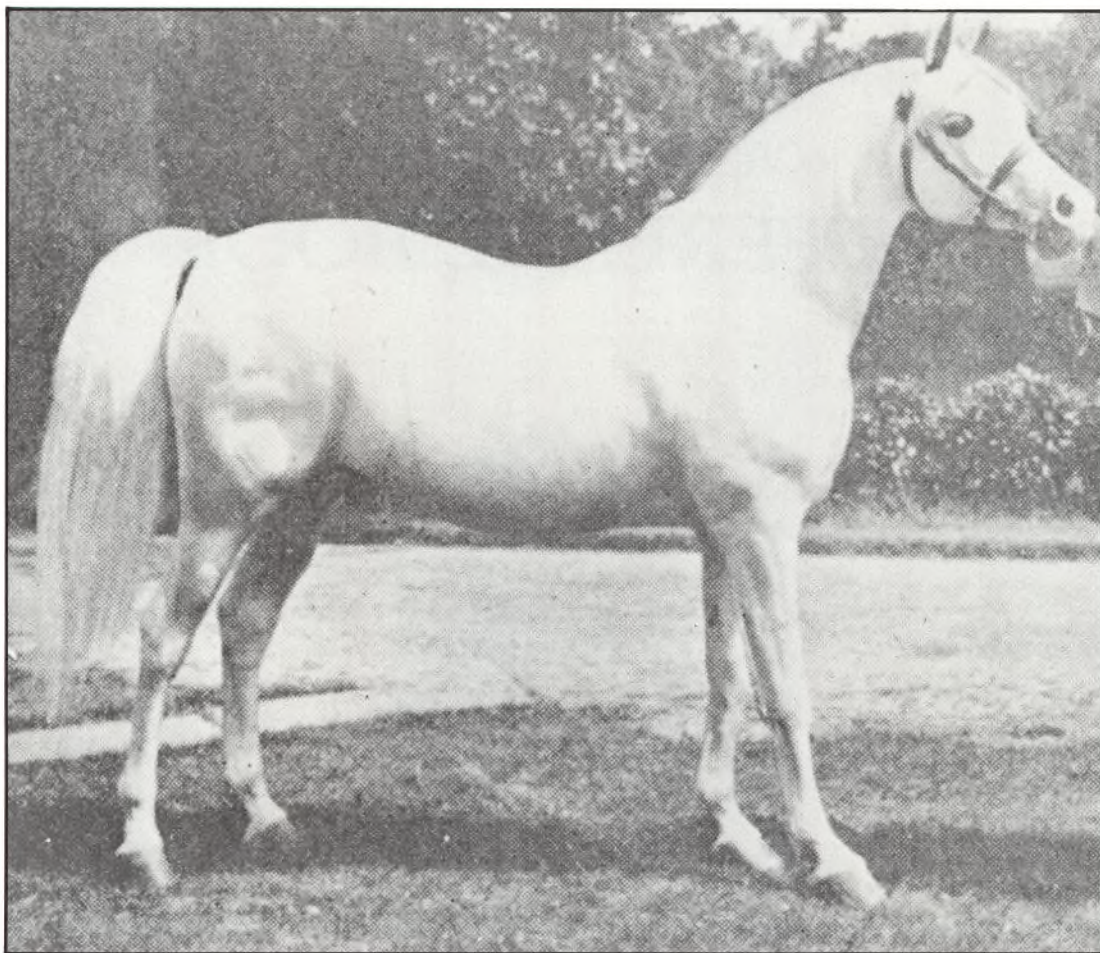

THE CRABBET ARABIAN

What do we associate with the word "Crabbet" in the world today?

Is it a type of Arabian; is it a place; or is it History?

Actually, it is all these things.

It is a type of Arabian, bred at a certain place, that has a notable history; has earned distinction today, and will play its part in an impressive future.

While the history of the Arabian begins with the history of civilisation, its impact on Europe can be dated from the early 19th century onwards, when two dedicated travellers in the desert, Wilfrid Scawen Blunt and his wife, Lady Anne Blunt saw for themselves the true Arabian horse of the desert, observed the increasing rarity of the finest of the breed, and determined to obtain at whatever cost to themselves, a sufficient number of foundation stock to establish the breed in England. "We have made a plan," wrote Lady Anne from Syria in 1877, "of importing some of the best Anazeh blood into England and breeding it pure there."

This plan came to fruition, though not without great sacrifice of the personal tenor of their lives, and by the time Lady Anne died, forty years later, the Crabbet Arabian Stud had grown to be the largest collection of pure Arabians in existence outside their native homeland, the Desert.

The immeasurable value of this collection and its future were at risk for a period after the death of Lady Anne, but it was saved, to enter into the greatest years of its history when the Stud became the inheritance of the Blunts' daughter, Judith, Lady Wentworth.

It was during Lady Wentworth's life-time that "Crabbet-bred" became the hallmark of the 'asil' Arabian.

The greatest contribution made by the Crabbet Stud was not merely the breeding of the best horses, but the *sharing* of this excellence with other centres of Arabian breeding, thus widening the scope and the interchange of blood-lines in the years to come.

Lady Anne Blunt had given to the Royal Agricultural

Society of Egypt, three important mares from Sheik Obeydh; Jamil, Ghadia and Jemla; later, the mare Durra, sold by Blunt.

Lady Wentworth, in 1920, sold 19 horses to the R.A.S. in Egypt, and in 1936, 6 stallions and 19 mares were sold to Russia.

The authenticity and influence of these horses, down the years, can be studied in detail in that most informative and authoritative book, recently published, *The History of the Crabbet Stud*, by Archer, Pearson & Covey.

I am extending this Article with photographs of Arabians today who illustrate the qualities which only Crabbet blood can impart.

Now we must leave history to consider our responsibility for the present, and for the future of the priceless legacy we have inherited.

This responsibility is shared with breeders of Arabians world-wide. The generation we are considering cannot all claim to be Crabbet-bred, but are of Crabbet blood, in greater or lesser degree.

For example, in South Africa we have generations of one of the greatest Crabbet stallions, Raktha, imported in 1952, and of the other valuable stallions, Shalwan, Royal Crystal and Chief Kasalo.

In Australia we have the Crabbet-bred stallion, Sindh, and others of equal importance in their impact on the breeding programmes of the country. To mention a few, Count Manilla, Grand Royal, Riffal, Crystal Magic and Royal Domino.

All have earned their fame for their legacy of excellence.

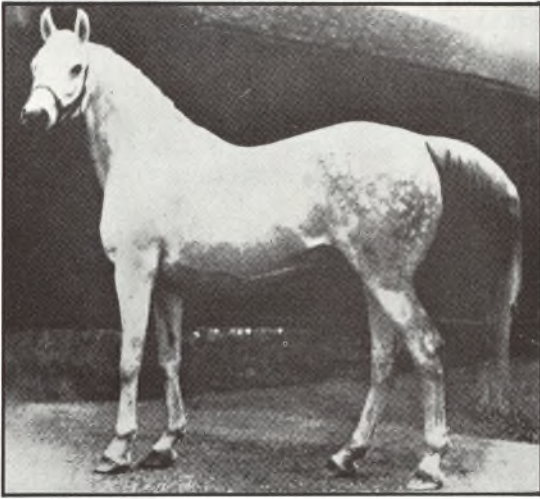
In the United States we have the largest collection in the world of pure-bred and line-bred Crabbet stock.

Do we ever consider a certain point in history? Had it not been for the vision and dedication of the Blunts, there might never have been a resurgence of interest in the breeding of the 'asil' Arabian, except as a useful race-horse.

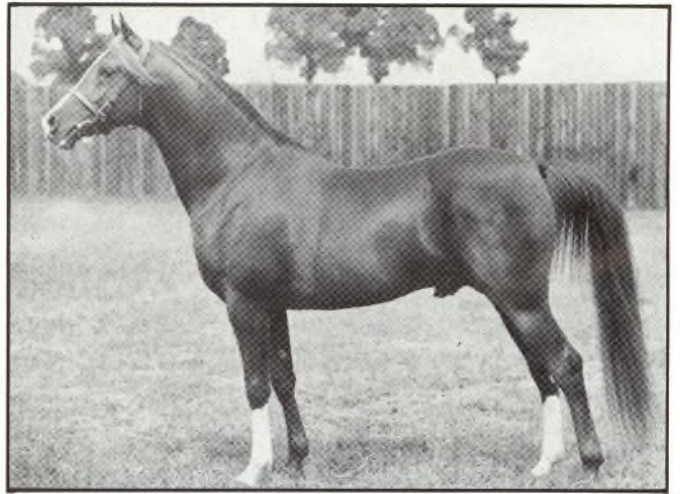
Truly, the title 'Crabbet' deserves immortality.



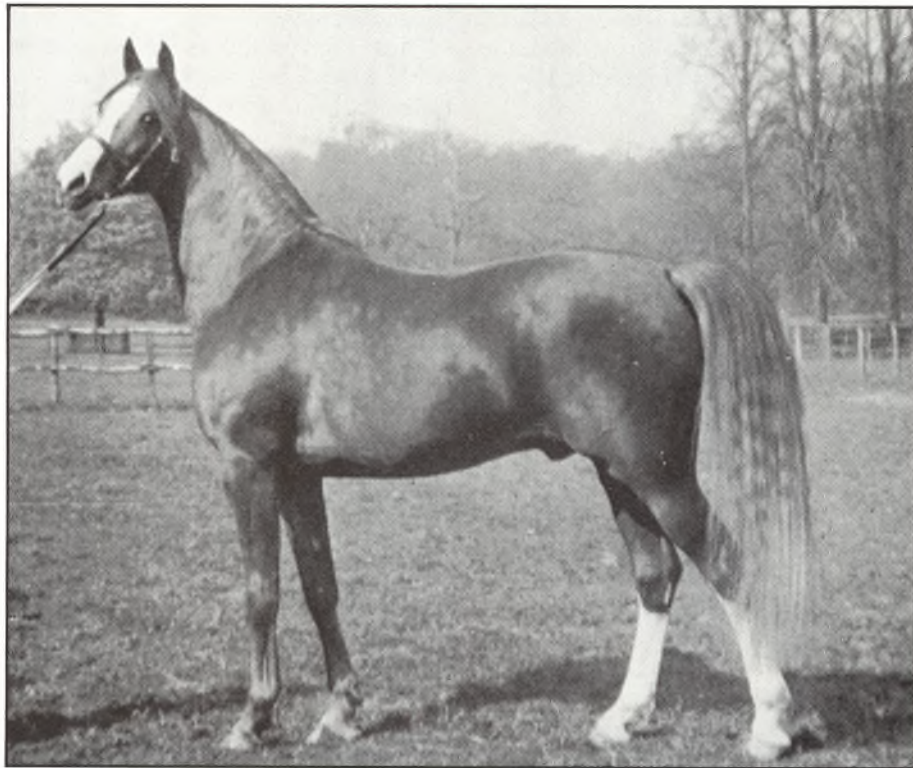
Lady Wentworth with Grey Royal and Sharima.



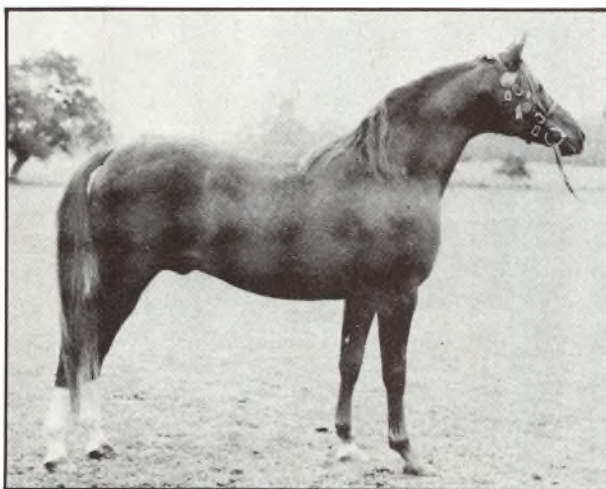
Silver Fire — one of the great "Silver" mares.



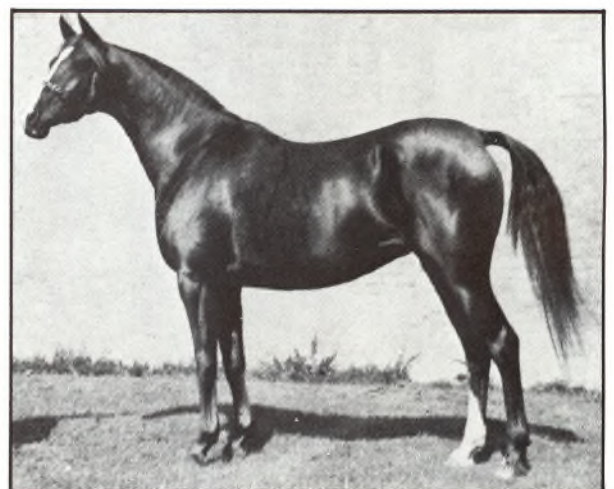
Blue Domino (Rissalix x Niseyra)



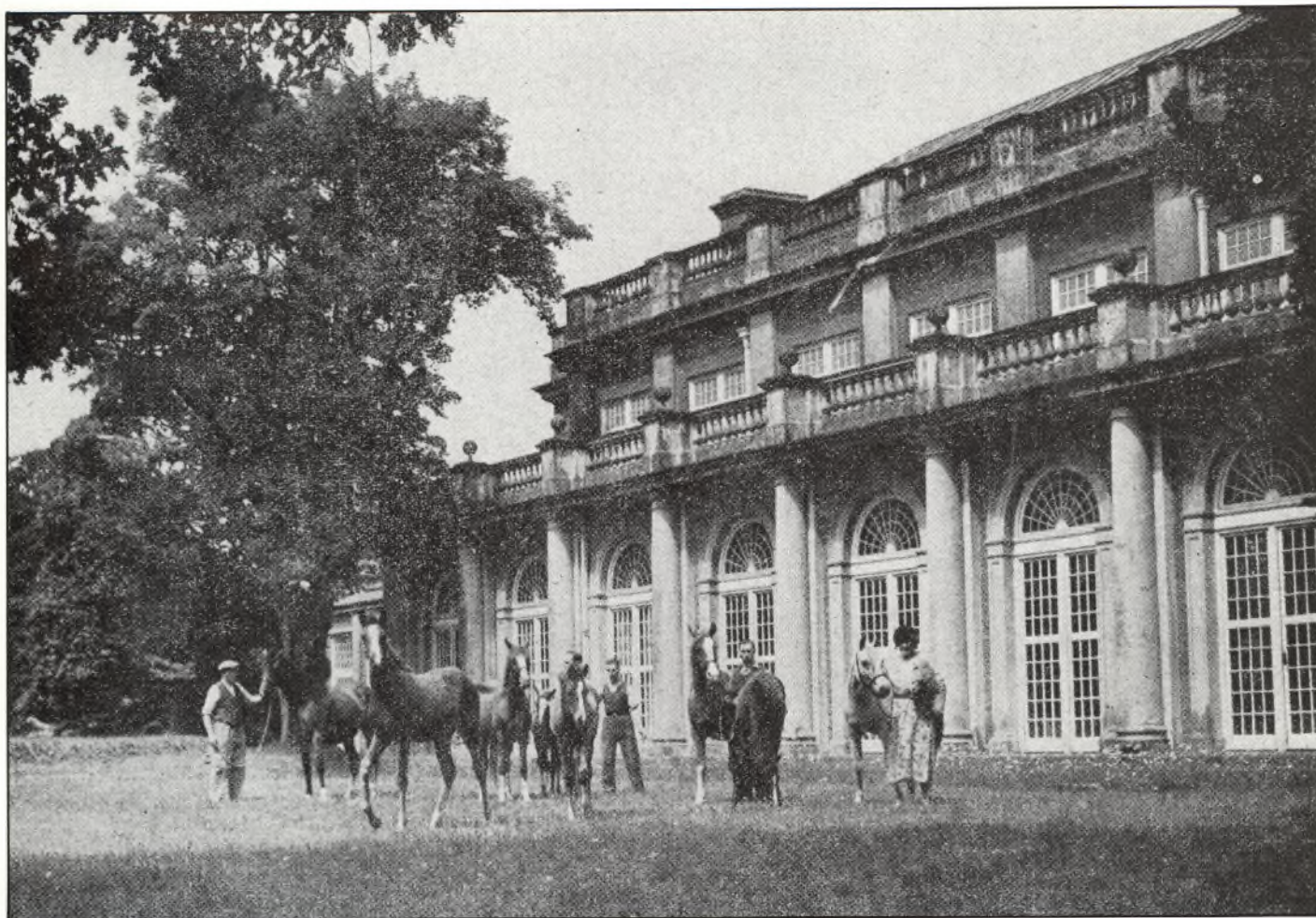

Indian Diamond by Oran



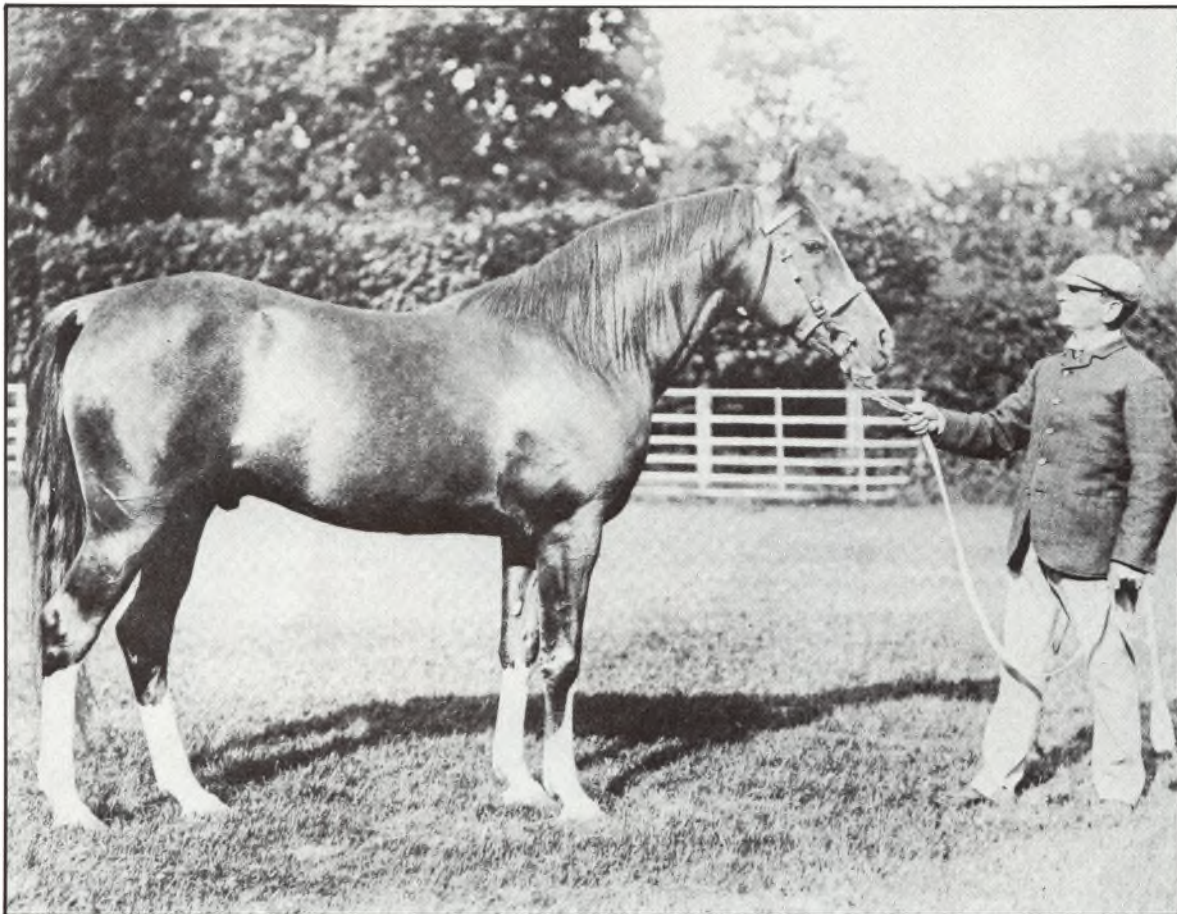

INTRODUCTION TO COLIN PEARSON

The unique importance of this office is that its influence is widespread. Its doors are ever open to give information, advice and encouragement to anyone with an interest in the Arabian world, both at home and abroad. The responsibility rests with the administrator, himself an owner of Arabians since 1958, who, by his personality and dedication to the interests of the Arabian world, has given our Society its unrivaled influence and respect. My friends, may I introduce the administrator of the Arab Horse Society of Great Britain — Colin Pearson.

HISTORY OF THE CRABBET STUD

I feel greatly honoured and privileged to address you at this meeting today. It is always a pleasure for me to meet and talk with American people for invariably they are generous and welcoming people and so far on this visit that generosity is already obvious.

Margaret Greely has been a great and dear friend and inspiration to me constantly over the thirty years I have known her. In some ways the association goes back further than those years for my wife studied under her even more time ago.

The passage of years, however, is no indication of aging, for all those who know Margaret Greely well, know her as one eternally fresh and young in spirit, giving out more than she receives. It is accordingly very comforting and reassuring to have been introduced to you by such a dear and loved friend. Thank you, Margaret.

Generous thanks are due to Mrs. Bazy Tankersley who with Margaret had the foresight and inspiration to assemble all of us here for this discussion on Arabian horses and the influence and effect the Crabbet Stud has had on the breeding and development and indeed the preservation of the entire breed wherever it is found — and I think that is true — wherever the Arabian breed of horses is found throughout the world.

The story which we are involved in, because any breeder of Arabian horses becomes intimately involved, is a romantic and thrilling story, spanning more than a life-time, in fact more than 100 years beginning perhaps in 1877-78 when two visionary people, Lady Anne Blunt, granddaughter of the poet Byron and her husband Wilfrid Scawen Blunt travelled to Syria in search of representatives of the same strain of the Arabian horse as that of the famous 17th-century racehorse the Darley Arabian, a founder of the English thoroughbred breed.

This search was supported financially also by Lady Anne Blunt's brother, Ralph Milbanke, 13th Baron Wentworth and later 2nd Earl Lovelace, who had accompanied the Blunts on their earlier travels to Algeria in 1873.

Scawen Blunt's health was supposedly bad as a result of his being consumptive. With hindsight it could be queried whether his illness was as real as he imagined it to be, certainly his travels must in any case have been beneficial, for he lived to the age of 82.

Before elaborating on their search for Arabian horses it is pertinent to remember that in 1878 the internal combustion engine was effectively still a dream and that steam locomotive power a relatively recent reality. Across the seas it was still the age of sails and consequently the world was as

highly dependent on it's beast of burden the horse as it had ever been. In fact the horse was in it's heyday.

Arabian horses had been renowned for centuries for their naturally good conformation, endurance and agility. Their prepotency enabled them to impart these qualities to their offspring so making the Arab preminent for improving and creating breeds, particularly riding and calvary horses. Their success in the latter category can easily be measured by reference to the history of army campaigns in Europe, the Middle East, India and Africa, in fact throughout the world.

In the latter part of the 19th century the supply of true desert bred Arabian horses was extremely limited — it had never been great — and the Blunts with remarkable perception realized that European horse breeders desperately needed a nucleus of Arabian horses of unquestionable purity before the source of its lands of origin were dissipated and perhaps lost for all time.

Really, the Blunts were both exceptional persons; talented persons with the ability to write prose and verse, to paint, make music, create and maintain estates, also to act as their own architects and for Blunt himself to take an active part in the politics of the day with an uncanny foresight into what the future had in store several decades ahead. Amateurs in an age of amateurs, verging on dilettante, but creative as part of the then Victorian epoch famed for its diligence and high aims and achievement, the Blunts were people of their age.

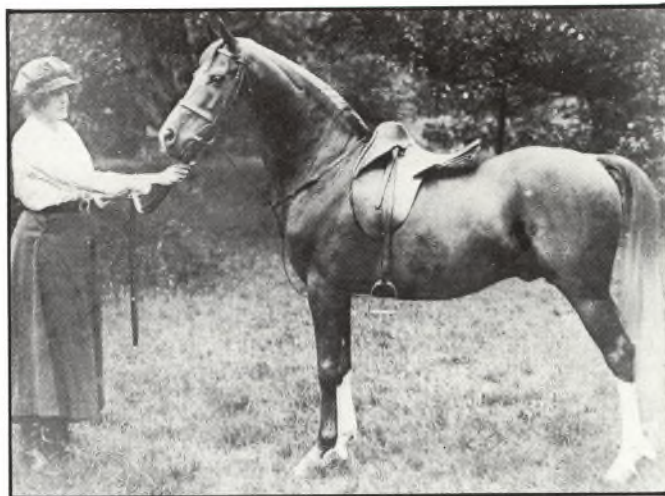
Their travels are recorded for those who care to read in their works: *The Bedouin Tribes of the Euphrates* and *A Pilgrimage to Nejd*, both written principally by Lady Anne Blunt. What concerns us at this moment though is the group of horses that they purchased in the deserts and the later groups of purchases collected by them nearer the turn of the century, principally from the stud of Ali Pasha Cherif who owned perhaps the most renowned and select group of Arabian horses ever assembled in the world.

It is not my intention to speak of all the animals purchased and selected by the Blunts but more to highlight those horses whose influence is still widely available to us breeders of Arabian horses throughout the world.

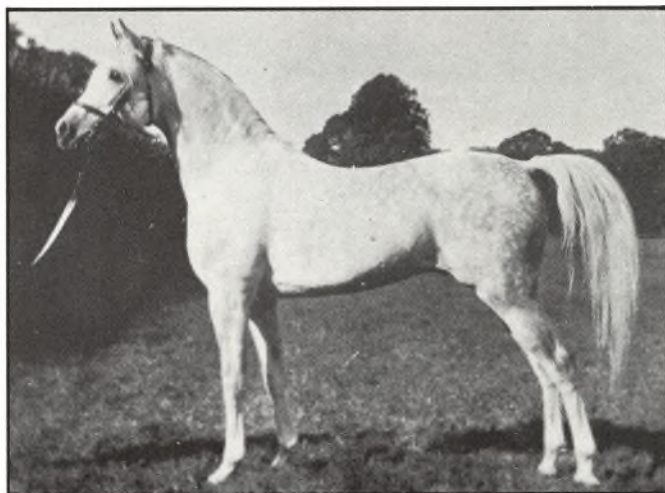
The Blunts were unique in that they travelled in the desert with the tribes, searching for the best specimens of desert bred horses and later residing in Egypt, keeping in close and constant contact with Arab horse breeding affairs in the Middle East.

Life has many untold mysteries and secrets which we in our 'civilized' state are too conditioned to understand and it is perhaps one of these hidden impulses which caused the Blunts to buy first of all in the desert on Christmas Day 1877, a yearling filly of the Dajanieh strain. This filly was known severally as Lady Hestor, Jasmine or Jessamine. Ultimately she was named Dajania and became one of the most important foundation mares at the Crabbet Stud. To digress for a moment, Crabbet House was build by the Blunts to their own design on the site of an old mansion they inherited. The Stud was formed on the estate in the surrounding parkland.

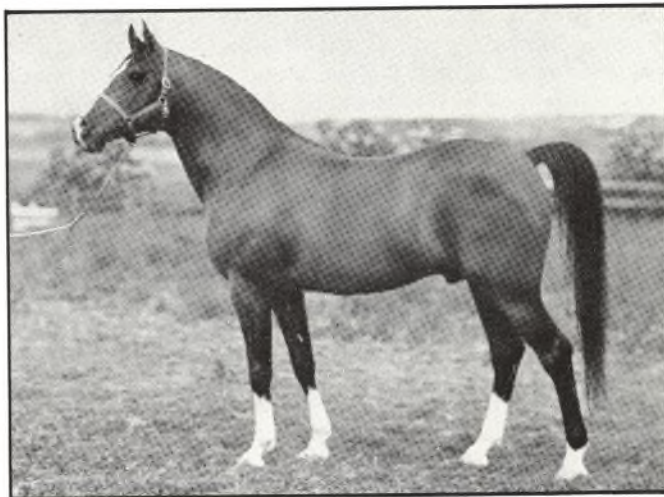
To go back to Dajania, she and her dam had a chequered history of ownership for her dam was stolen from the Sebaa Anazeh tribe by Mohammed Pasha, a Turcoman chief. In turn, her foal Dajania was stolen from Mohammed Pasha and sold to the Blunts, who at that time were not aware of this fact concerning her provenance and which perhaps contributed to her being available for purchase. Be that as it may, Dajania was a fortuitous acquisition for she founded

the 'N' family.

The most notable of this family being her one daughter, Nefisa by Hadban, dam of 21 foals which include the mares Narghileh and Nasra whose influence in the U.K., USA and U.S.S.R. through to Poland and most other countries in the world is boundless, or should I say limitless. In many respects it can be considered that the 'N' family is one of sires as Nasra was the dam of *Nureddin II, *Nasik, Naseem and Naziri. The effect of these four stallions on domestic horse breeding in the States is considerable whilst in England, Russia, Australia and South Africa it is of major importance.

Another equally important early purchase, shall we say a giantess in the breed, was the mare Rodania. She like Dajania was a stolen horse, a prize being taken in war from Ibn Rodan (the son of Rodan), chief of the Roal tribe. The Blunts purchased her from Tais Ibn Sharban of the Gomussa tribe of Sebaa Anazeh in 1881 and she was shipped to England that year. Whilst Dajania had but one daughter Nefisa, Rodania had three, Rose of Jericho, *Rose of Sharon and Rosemary. The first named Rose of Jericho was sold in 1891 for shipment to Australia leaving behind an Azrek daughter Rose Diamond, owned later by Capt. The Honorable George Savile. This line still persists to this day in the U.K. but of course is well dispersed in the U.S.A. through Rose Diamond's Mesaoud son Lal I Abdar, renamed *Abu Zeyd. The other two daughters, *Rose of Sharon and Rosemary, feature dominantly in English horse breeding with perhaps 35% of the registered mares in our Stud Book being their descendants in tail female line and with almost the entire British population of Arabian horses. having Rodania's name and this can be said of Dajania's also, in their pedigrees.

Other desert mares purchased of continuing moment today are Basilisk, Hagar, Queen of Sheba and Ferida. The contribution made by the line from Basilisk is not very noticeable until it is realized that her granddaughter Bukra was dam of *Berk who has been so influential as I will mention in a moment. Further effects the line has had is through the part it played in the formation of the Stud of the late H. V. M. Clark at Courthouse Farm and through those horses influencing breeding, particularly in South Africa and Australia, also to a certain extent in this country through her descendants Battla and Bushra. Hagar, Lady Anne Blunt's riding mare, had descendants in an early English breeder's stud, Capt. The Hon. George Savile. This stud dispersed in the 30s. The blood is now to be found, apart from the USA, in Holland, South Africa and the U.K. Queen of Sheba was an important mare as she was mated to another important early purchase, Azrek, and in turn foaled Ahmar and ten years later she foaled *Astrald by Mesaoud, purchased by the American Lothrop Ames. It is my considered opinion that in England if you wish for free spectacular movement the easiest way to obtain it is from mares tracing to Queen of Sheba. An example of this is the Rissalix horses who in my humble opinion derive their movement from his dam Rissla, thence from her sire *Berk, a son of Ahmar and Bukra whose pedigree traces to both Pharaoh and Basilisk.

Let us now consider the male horses. The stallions the Blunts acquired during their travels, Kars and Pharaoh, both bays, were the first purchases though neither are perpetuated by sire lines nor did the later importation of Hadban, another bay, found a sire line. Another horse described in the Crabbet stud books is Azrek and here I will quote from Lady Anne Blunt's writing: "A magnificent

horse in every way, grand head and neck, powerful shoulder with unrivalled trotting action." How sad it was for the breed that this horse was so little used before he was sold.

The fact that these stallions do not have sire lines to represent them today does not reflect adversely on their significance to the breed. Hadban sired two most important mares, Rodania, daughter of *Rose of Sharon and Nefisa, Dajania's daughter. Kars sired the Rodania daughter, Rose of Jericho. Pharaoh's daughter Bozra was granddam of Belka, the 300-mile race winner. An interesting point here, is there any significance that Belka's dam was by Ahmar, son of Azrek.

Having briefly enumerated the original desert importations which have influence on today's horses I will mention a few horses purchased by the Blunts in Egypt.

Most importantly these include Mesaoud, Feysul and Mahruss. Without doubt Mesaoud, a descendent via Harkan and Aziz of the original desert-bred stallion Zobeyni has had the most widespread influence on Arab horse breeding in the last one hundred years. The possibility that the breeding of Mesaoud's dam Yehameh may have been Shueyman out of Bint Ghazieh still has to be confirmed in the Blunts' writings. Hopefully research will eventually prove this. Should it be substantiated it would again emphasize the smallness of the total number of Arabian horses being bred from, and perhaps available to be bred from in the royal studs in Egypt in the late 19th century.

We know from lithographs and paintings, particularly those of Victor Adam, the names of many horses in the Abbas Pasha stud. This scarcity of stock was common knowledge to the Blunts and all the more reason for them to purchase the choicest specimens as and when they became available. By living in Egypt they had close contact with the prominent owners of the day, the princes and their horses and so were well placed to purchase when these studs and particularly that of Ali Pasha Sherif became available. Many mares were obtained in Egypt including Bint Helwa and Sobha, the latter who has needless to say considerable effect on modern pedigrees both in the U.K. and also Russia, where her dam line is I believe the second most prolific.

To go back to the stallions, the sire line of Feysul is not so firmly based as that of Mesaoud but he of course has extreme significance via his granddaughter Razina by his son Rasim, she being the foundation mare in Lady Yule's Hanstead Stud. The stallion Raktha, senior sire at Crabbet in its later years, was bred by Lady Yule from Razina. The third stallion Mahruss or more correctly, Ibn Mahruss, was related to Mesaoud. The Mahruss line developed principally through his son Rijm and his sons *Nasik and *Nureddin II and from the latter to Faris, sire of Rissalix, thence to Blue Domino. I will leave it to later speakers to elaborate on that theme.

But now I will speak of Judith Lady Wentworth, daughter of Lady Anne and Wilfrid Blunt. Lady Wentworth was a remarkable woman, determined, egoistical, artistic and yet practical. It was under her management that the Crabbet Stud prospered and made its greatest and most powerful effect on the world population of Arabian horses. I can not think of any other single person whose authority has dominated a breed of horses to the extent that their name is universally recognised throughout the world. Lady Wentworth was a genius without rival. In her endeavor to produce better horses she was never so conservative in her approach to think her horses were the best.



Lady Wentworth in front of the Coronation Stables. Silver Fire with foal on the right.

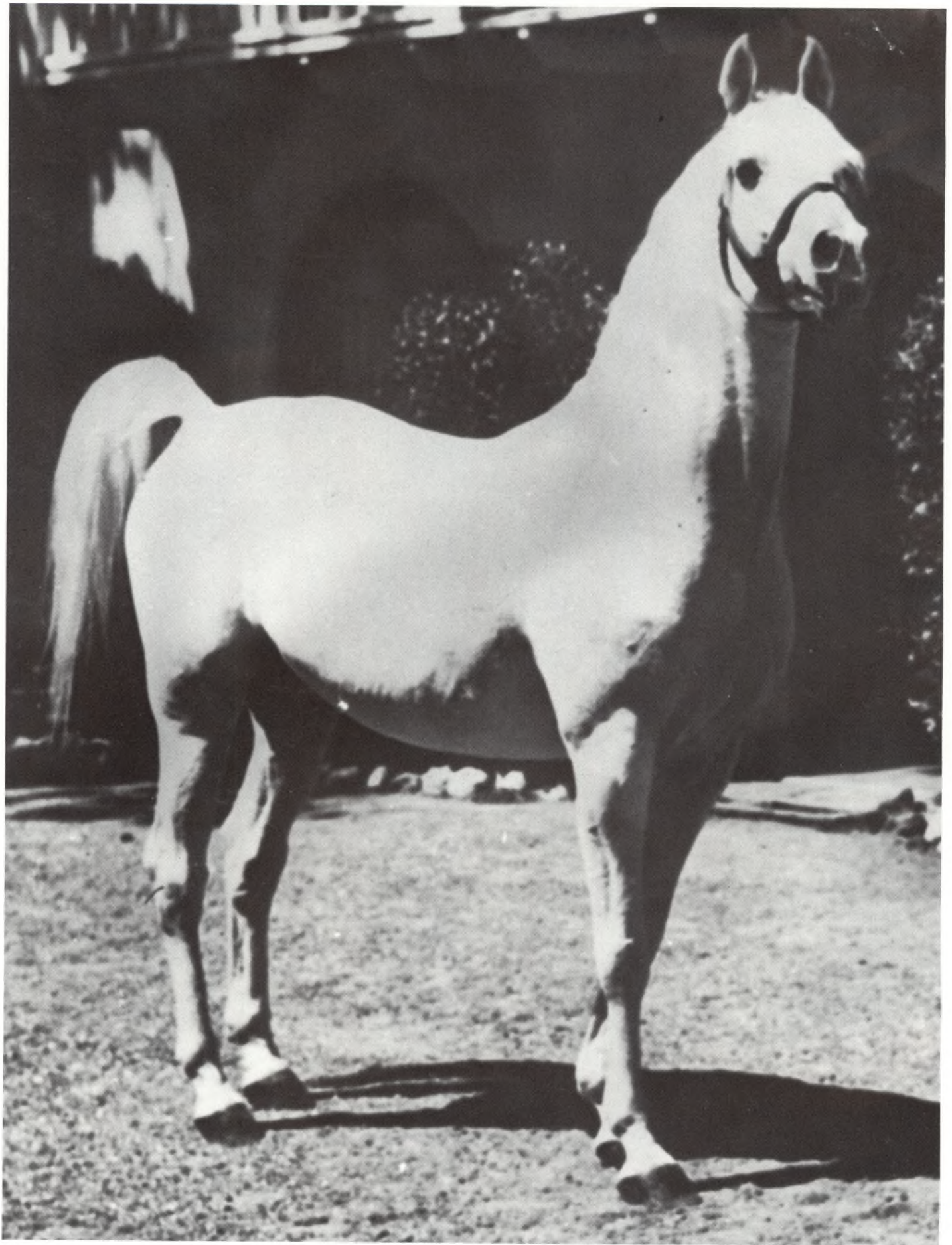
Skowronek was acquired in 1920. This horse had been imported to England around 1913 by Walter Winans, son of a Russian-American railway builder. Winans was a man of immense wealth and was an avid breeder of Hackney and trotting horses. He was a sculptor of no mean achievement, exhibiting regularly at the Royal Academy in London. His first exhibit there was a bronze, Chief Sitting Bull. Later bronzes included a westernised version of Skowronek. Needless to say, Skowronek founded a dynasty of horses for Lady Wentworth, adding perhaps more Arabian type to the well-structured Crabbet horses. Lady Wentworth also used *Nureddin II, direct male great grandson of Mahruss, a horse her father had sold to Sidney Hough which she repurchased. His full brother perhaps of more quality was *Nasik. A mare of the rare Krush strain was incorporated into the stud. Her daughter Dafinetta became foundation mare in the stud established by Lord and Lady Moyne. Later purchases included Dargee, a horse who had considerable effect on the stud in its later years.

The early purchases by W.R. Brown of America were

followed by those of Kellogg and Selby, so laying a substantial foundation on which breeding in America expanded. Lady Wentworth exported groups of horses to Egypt, Australia, Spain, Russia and to South Africa. In all these countries pedigrees trace to horses bred at Crabbet in major degree.

Her death in 1957 was the end of an era but an opportunity for those swift to act. Mrs. Bazy Tankersley arranged purchase of a huge consignment of horses from Crabbet and from the Hanstead Stud, whose owner, Miss Gladys Yule, had died unexpectedly. What an opportunity, the results of which we see in this country today, particularly in the Double R program.

The Blunts in their searches many years ago succeeded in collecting the best specimens of Arabian horses. Their ideal of preserving them has succeeded despite two world wars and times of near extinction for the breed. May this gathering today help to ensure the continuance of the good effect association with the breed has upon people, so leading to a fuller life in this ever accelerating world.



EARLY AMERICAN CRABBET

The Crabbet Stud was only 15 years old when its first breeding branch was transplanted to North America in 1893. The only Arab stud here at that time was Randolph Huntington's *Naomi 230 project, on Long Island, N.Y. Huntington's part-Crabbet colt *Garaveen 244, an import from the stud of the Rev. F. F. Vidal, was a grandson of the original Crabbet head sire, Kars. *Garaveen became head sire for J. A. P. Ramsdell of Newburgh, N.Y. Ramsdell himself had begun in 1893 by importing part-Crabbet Arabs from the Puddlicote Stud of the Hon. Miss Dillon. His most illustrious import came from the Blunts in 1895: the silver-white Ali Pasha Sherif stallion *Shahwan 241. Ramsdell was to stay with Arabs until about 1910. Descent has not been preserved from his Dillon stock but the lines of *Garaveen and *Shahwan run through many modern pedigrees.

A Mr. Eustis imported the bay Crabbet mare *Bushra 23 in 1900. She was a daughter of Azrek and Bozra, and came in foal to Mahruss II. Her chestnut colt of 1901 was named *Ibn Mahruss 22. This pair was owned by Homer Davenport by 1906, and so passed into posterity. *Bushra's daughter Sira 85, by the desertbred *Hamrah 28, founded her own branch of the Basilisk family at Hingham Stock Farm, then the largest Arab stud in North America. *Ibn Mahruss was sold by Davenport to Eleanor Gates of California, and got a number of foals in the Golden State.

The important one of these was his son El Jafil 74, whose son El Sabok 276 became head sire in Albert W. Harris's program and sired influential offspring, chief among them Stambul 575. Leila 275, full sister to El Sabok, founded a family which still breeds on.

Spencer Borden's Interlachen Stud in Fall River, Mass. got its start in 1898. He imported his first Arabs of Crabbet breeding in 1905, several of them bred by Miss Dillon. These included *Nessa 222 and *Mahal 224, daughters of the Blunt mare Raschida and responsible for the existence today of the Wild Thyme family line. Borden also brought a mare directly from Crabbet in 1905 — not merely "a mare" but the illustrious 20-year-old *Rose of Sharon 246, already dam in England of Rijm and Ridaa. *Rose of Sharon was in foal to Harb, son of Mesaoud and Bint Helwa, and a horse greatly admired by Borden. In 1906 she produced *Rodan 258, the world's only source of the Harb influence in modern pedigrees. *Rose of Sharon also produced Rosa Rugosa 166 for Borden, sired by the Dillon horse *Imamzada 210, and this mare is found in many pedigrees through some first-class descendants.

Borden's 1906 book *The Arab Horse* is still in print, and influenced the spread of the breed — and of the Crabbet influence — in this country.

Not all of Borden's imports have descent today, but those which do have made major contributions. The 1908

Ghazi, (*Rodan x Guemera, a daughter of *Ghazala). *Ghazala was bred by Ali Pasha Sherif. Ghazi was purchased at the Maynesboro dispersal by W. R. Hearst's San Simeon Stud. *Rodan was a son of the great Rodania daughter, *Rose of Sharon. *Rodan's sire, Harb, was a son of Mesaoud and Bint Helwa, 100% Ali Pasha Sherif breeding.

Crabbet import *Butheyra 251 bred on via her daughter Bathsheba 280, sired by a 1910 Borden import from Miss Dillon. This was *Hauran 197, son of the famous Blunt journey mare Hagar. In 1909 Borden had the good fortune to bring in one of the two Ibn Sherara daughters which had served the Blunts as riding mares at their Egyptian home, Sheykh Obeyd. This of course was Bint Helwa's daughter *Ghazala 211, bred by Ali Pasha Sherif, and already dam in Egypt of two daughters which would be influential worldwide through the EAO and Babson breeding. *Ghazala's breeding offspring in this country were the superb and prolific mares Guemura 277 and Gulnare 278, the latter linebred to Bint Helwa since her sire was *Rodan.

The Interlachen Stud was the first real Crabbet nursery in North America, responsible for a number of major elements in the spread of the Crabbet influence. Today its presence has become international.

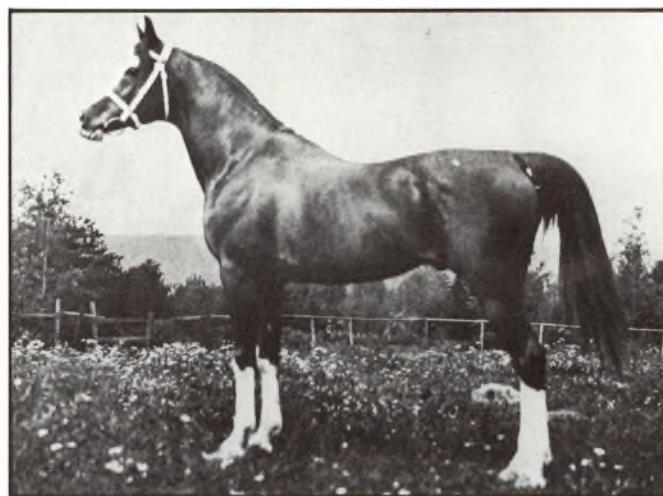
F. Lothrop Ames imported several Crabbet Arabs to Boston, Mass. beginning in 1905. His first import to breed on successfully came in 1908. This was the most influential of Mesaoud's sons, *Astraled 238. *Astraled had left progeny in England which were to exceed *Ghazala's Egyptian daughters in influence; these included the mares Rim, Riyala, Rokhama and Selima and the stallions Rustem, Razaz and Sotamm. *Astraled sired a few foals in New England before going to Oregon as a U.S. Army Remount sire. He was to be heard from again.

In 1910 Ames imported *Narda II 164, a daughter of the great Narghileh. *Narda had a yearling colt by Rijm who was imported with her and named *Crabbet 309 in honor of his origin. *Narda was bred back to Rijm and produced the filly *Noam 167 in 1911. *Crabbet was gelded and so has no genetic influence today; his illustrious performance career was so positive a contribution that he must be mentioned. *Noam was luckier and founded a strong branch of the Nefisa family.

Homer Davenport also imported Crabbet Arabs in 1910. Of his three, only one left descent, but this was the great *Abu Zeyd 82 (Lal-I-Abdar in GSB), thought Mesaoud's finest son by the late Lady Anne Lytton. *Abu Zeyd became a most influential sire of beauty and quality, and his distinctive type is still greatly prized.

These 18 animals set the stage for Crabbet breeding in North America before the First World War. Their influence is brought into modern times primarily through W. R. Brown's Maynesboro Stud. Brown founded this venture in Berlin, N.H., appropriately in 1914, on stock secured from his brother, H. J. Brown of Graunkar, Me. H. J. Brown bred six foals between 1911 and 1914; he had acquired a few horses, including *Abu Zeyd, from the estate of Homer Davenport. He also bred the first foals from Borden's Rosa Rugosa. The only horse in modern pedigrees bred by H. J. Brown is the chestnut 1913 *Astraled daughter Kheyra 229, out of Rosa Rugosa.

Maynesboro breeding, founded on early Crabbet, permeates modern North American pedigrees. W. R. Brown's stud produced nearly 200 Arabs in 21 foal crops. A mere recital of names is boring for everyone, but some references to key horses will be necessary to give a feeling for the scope of the Maynesboro influence. Maynesboro was the second important Crabbet nursery, and its influence outweighs that of Interlachen. Brown came to own the Borden horses and they are represented today via their Maynesboro offspring. Had W. R. Brown not founded Maynesboro, there might well be no descent today from Borden's stock or from the Ramsdell and Lothrop Ames horses.

Brown rapidly expanded his breeding base. He bought a number of animals of Randolph Huntington's non-Crabbet breeding and a few from other sources. His great coup came in 1918 with the purchase of 18 horses from Wilfrid Blunt, then in sole possession of Crabbet (after Lady Anne's death and before the settlement of the lawsuit).

Blunt is on record as not liking *Berk 343, though he sired Rissla, Rhythma, Rangha, Safarjal and Rukham in England. The four mares are widely influential today via offspring bred by Crabbet, Ruxton, H. R. H. the Prince of Wales (later the Duke of Windsor), and Musgrave Clark. Rukham is a key sire in Argentine pedigrees. At any rate *Berk was allowed to come to New Hampshire; at Maynesboro he got just four foals but these all bred on, and included the illustrious Ribal 397 and Roshana 401.

*Nafia 356 and the *en utero* *Rizvan 381 completed the breeding males of the importation. *Nafia was sold back to Crabbet, leaving one important foal in the mare Babirah 470. *Rizvan got several fine matrons including Bahreyn 603, Nadirat 619 and Gharifet 621. The successful mares of this group included *Baraza 344, *Battla 345 (dam of Babirah and Bahreyn, the latter produced after her re-sale to Crabbet), *Rijma 346 (dam in England of the internationally influential Riz, and in this country of *Rizvan, Ribal and Raad 474), Ramla 347 (barren, but a great endurance mare), *Ramim 348 (dam of Rehal 504), *Rokhsa 351 (dam of Roshana and the great Rabiya 577), *Hazna, *Simawa (dam of Katar 724) and *Felestin 359.

Brown's final Crabbet-bred import was *Hamida 509, in 1923. French Arabs came to Maynesboro in 1921 and 1922. The last addition to the Maynesboro gene pool, in 1932, was a group of horses from Prince Mohammed Ali. These Brown Egyptians all descended from the Sheykh Obeyd family of Yemama IV; Brown bred just three foals from them but they became widely influential through other studs.

W. R. Brown believed in the Arab's future as a calvary horse. This led to selection at Maynesboro for motion and balanced riding conformation, good bone, and dispositions amenable to everyday use. The horses were ridden by the family (Rabiyat had an early career as a polo pony) and some were used for light draught. Brown conducted private endurance tests and took part in tests put on by the Morgan Horse Club and the U.S. Calvary. Maynesboro horses, including *Crabbet and *Ramla, won three of the five U.S. Mounted Service Competitions and retired the Mounted Service Cup. *Rodan, Kheyra and *Noam were also successful competitors. Maynesboro colts were sold to be Remount sires; it may be regretted that they were lost to the breed, but they must have had a positive influence on the Arab's image as a using horse.

Brown's scholarly book, *The Horse of the Desert*, was published in 1929 and remains a standard reference work. It has recently been republished in Germany. The attractively produced Maynesboro Stud Catalogues were made available through national advertising. Both these publications promoted the Arab cause effectively. Unfortunately for those of us who live at this distance in time, no day-to-day account of the horses was published, which would bring them to life as individual personalities.

It is impossible to name all the Maynesboro horses found in modern pedigrees. The first Brown-bred of Crabbet ancestry to leave descent was *Rose of Sharon's grandson Sidi 223, foaled in 1917. Sidi is a source of Huntington and Dillon breeding in modern Arabs, but his descendants are firmly within the Crabbet breeding tradition. Bazrah 378, bred by Brown from the Borden horses *Rodan and Bathsheba and foaled in 1919, produced 20 foals and founded what is probably the strongest branch of the Basilisk family anywhere today.

Brown's Remount connections enabled him to have the great *Astrald posted back across the continent to

Maynesboro for the 1923 season. He settled just four mares, but the Borden mare Gulnare produced a 1924 colt who lived to be 32 and became one of the breed's genuine greats. His name, of course, was Gulastra 521.

The Bint Helwa family owes its modern importance to animals bred by Brown from Guemura and Gulnare, *Hazna and *Hamida. Bazrah was assisted in establishing the Basilisk line in America by *Battla and *Baraza. Rodania's influence runs through and through the Maynesboro pedigrees, as it does through most Crabbet-derived stock. All three of her daughters were influential at Maynesboro, close up in such horses as *Abu Zeyd, *Rodan, Rosa Rugosa, *Rijma and *Rokhsa. Nefisa's line was established through two of *Narda II's daughters, as was Sobha's through *Simawa.

All the sires used at Maynesboro after 1923 were Crabbet-bred within the Symposium definition, except the Egyptian *Nasr 889. Rehal, Ghazi 560 and Rahas 651 were major Maynesboro sires carrying up to a quarter non-Crabbet ancestry.

The last Arab foaled at Maynesboro was Azkar 1109, a 1935 son of Rahas and the Egyptian *Aziza 888. Nusara, Raab, Bazikh and Rabiyat foaled Brown-breds by Rahas at the Kellogg Ranch in 1936. Fittingly, the last horse bred by W. R. Brown was the future Kellogg head sire, Rabiyas 1236.

For a stud to be influential in the long run it must first breed stock which is deemed worthy of breeding on, and then pass those horses into the hands of breeders who are able to make good use of them. W. R. Brown was doubly fortunate in placing the Maynesboro stock at the Stud's dispersal. The Kellogg and Selby Crabbet imports of the 1920s and '30s were suitable for blending with the Maynesboro stock, and the buyers of the Maynesboro horses were to be among the most influential breeders in the country in the next phase of North America's Arab history.

Maynesboro-bred horses became key foundation animals in the California studs of W. K. Kellogg at Pomona and W. R. Hearst at San Simeon; in Gen. J. M. Dickinson's Tennessee stud at Traveler's Rest; and in a smaller way in the midwest with J. A. George and Arthur Ball. It seems safe to say that these breeders owed no small measure of their success to their good fortune in obtaining foundation stock of the quality of the Maynesboro Arabs.

DOYLE FAMILY GROUP

Dr. J.L. Doyle began breeding Arabian horses in 1947 with a group of predominately Davenport horses. Over the next four years he came to believe that the Arabian horses tracing to the stud of Abbas Pasha I, Viceroy of Egypt in the mid-nineteenth century were genetically the finest in the world. Others who shared this same belief were Carl Raswan, W. R. Brown, Lady Wentworth and the Blunts.

Because of the foresight of these people, there were horses still remaining in 1951 with a high percentage of Abbas Pasha blood. Dr. Doyle first acquired the mare, Gulida, who was by Gulastra and out of Valida. Gulida was a mare of 47% Abbas Pasha blood who was also of 100% Blunt ancestry, that is, tracing entirely to purchases made by the Blunts.

Gulida was first bred to Neesi, also of 100% Blunt ancestry. Later Doc acquired Ghadaf, a son of Ribal out of Gulnare, also of 100% Blunt Blood. Ghadaf was a sire of influence; his daughter, Aarah founding the famed Ben-Hur program and his daughter, Bint Gulida, set the endurance racing world on its ear by winning the Jim Shoulders One Hundred Mile Ride in five and a half hours, establishing a world record for 100 miles.

Ghadaf, Gulida and Im Gulnar (Gulida's daughter by Neesi) formed the foundation for the Doyle breeding. It remains unchanged today. Doyle breeding continues today

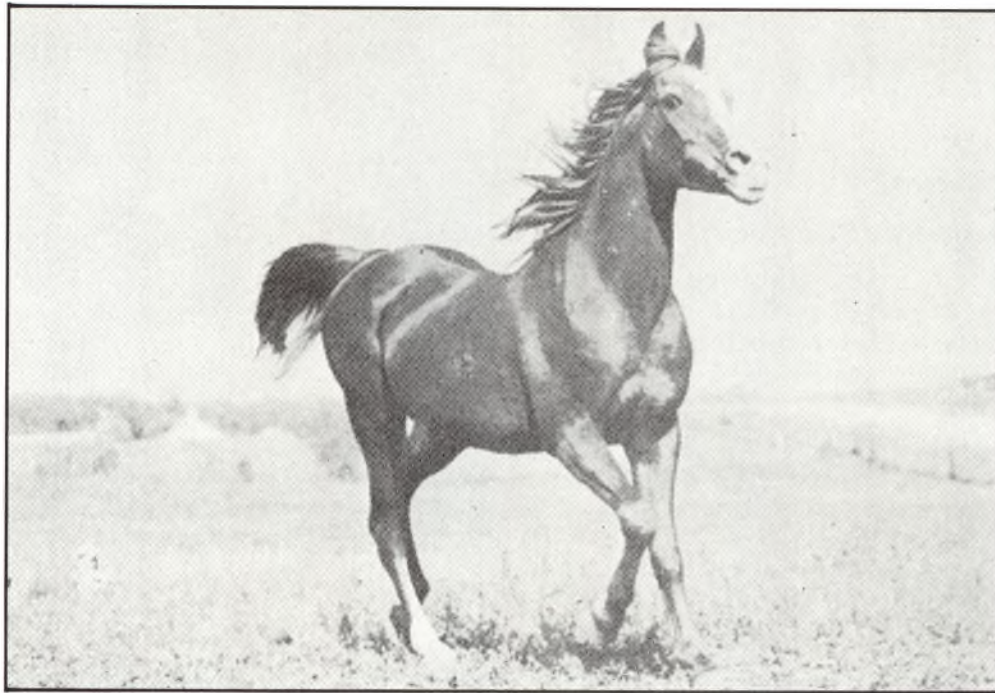
for various reasons. We look upon the Arab horse as the Bedouins did and as the Blunts did: that they are the ultimate functional saddle horse. The Bedouins lived or died by the quality of their mares. Sir Wilfrid Scawen Blunt, in his writings indicated that he felt the Arab to be the ultimate calvary mount.

Doyle breeders take great pride in the fact that our horses reflect their desert heritage and not the latest in show ring fads. Yes, Doyle horses have seen their glory days in the ring, but this must be taken with a grain of salt. Show ring success can be subject more to trend than to quality. We value more those things which more closely reflect the ideals of the Bedouins.

Many of these things are immeasurable: the intelligence and humanness of the horses; their enduring will and their elegance. Still, there are accurate reflections of the characteristics of the Bedouin horse.

Here in Colorado, Doyle horses have competed successfully as cutting horses. One old veteran of the cutting horse wars still earns his keep as a ranch horse for Jerry Smith of Colorado Springs.

Perhaps the competition which most accurately reflects the traits of a true Bedouin horse is the sport of endurance racing. It is a sport that requires stamina, intelligence, good functional confirmation and a tremendous will to win.

Eighty percent of all Doyle horses that have been endurance raced have finished TOP TEN, including Bint Gulida's amazing career, three top 10 Tevis Cup finishes (including a second) by the Doyle mare, Memshahib and a Top 10 in the 1980 IAHA National Championship 50 Miler by the Doyle stallion, Blarney.

Doyle breeders value intelligence, temperament and many

functional conformational qualities such as large nostrils, a clean throatlatch and clean fine legs.

Doyle breeders will continue to value our horses for what they are: reflections of desert breeding and a prepotent gene pool of those qualities most valued by the Bedouin. After all, the Bedouin had the Arabian horse 3,700 years before we Westerners.

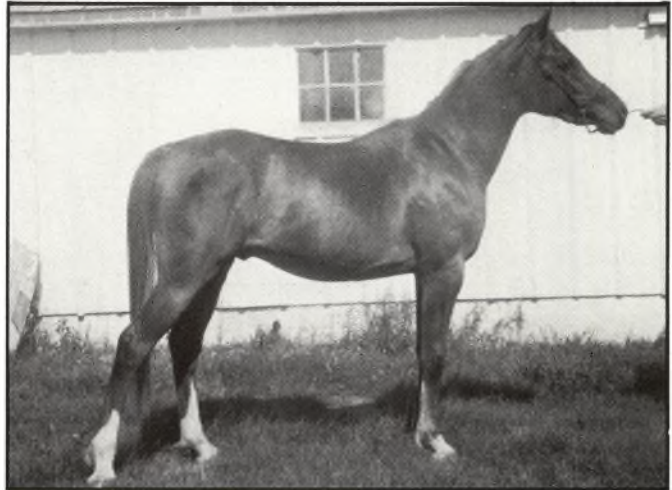

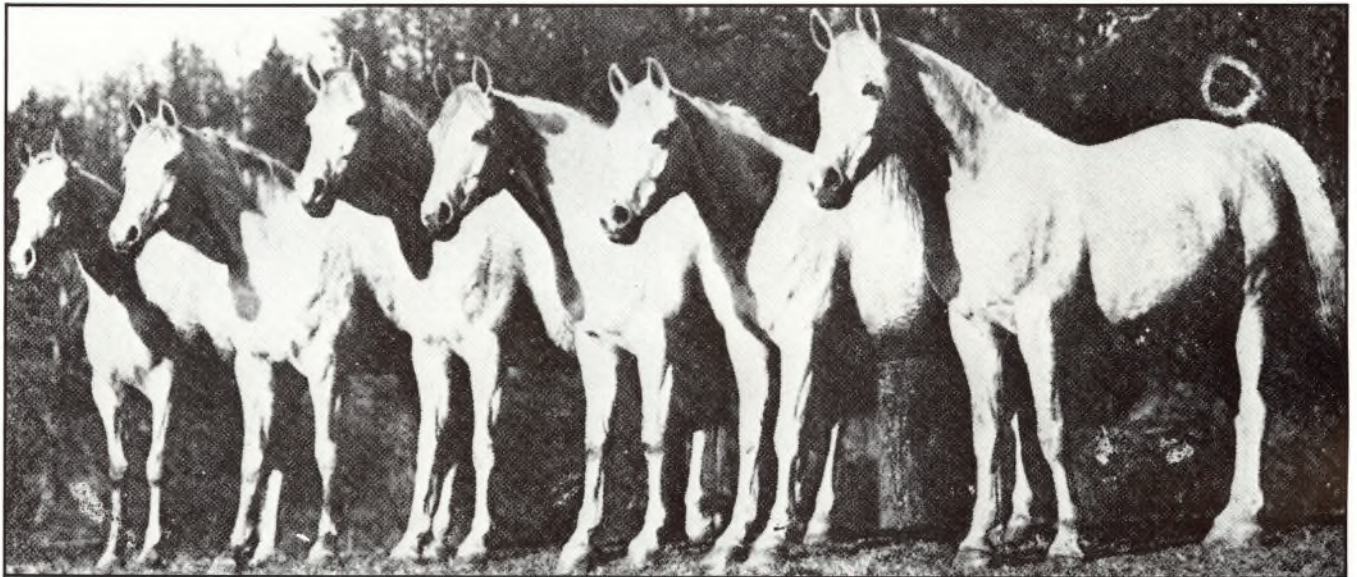

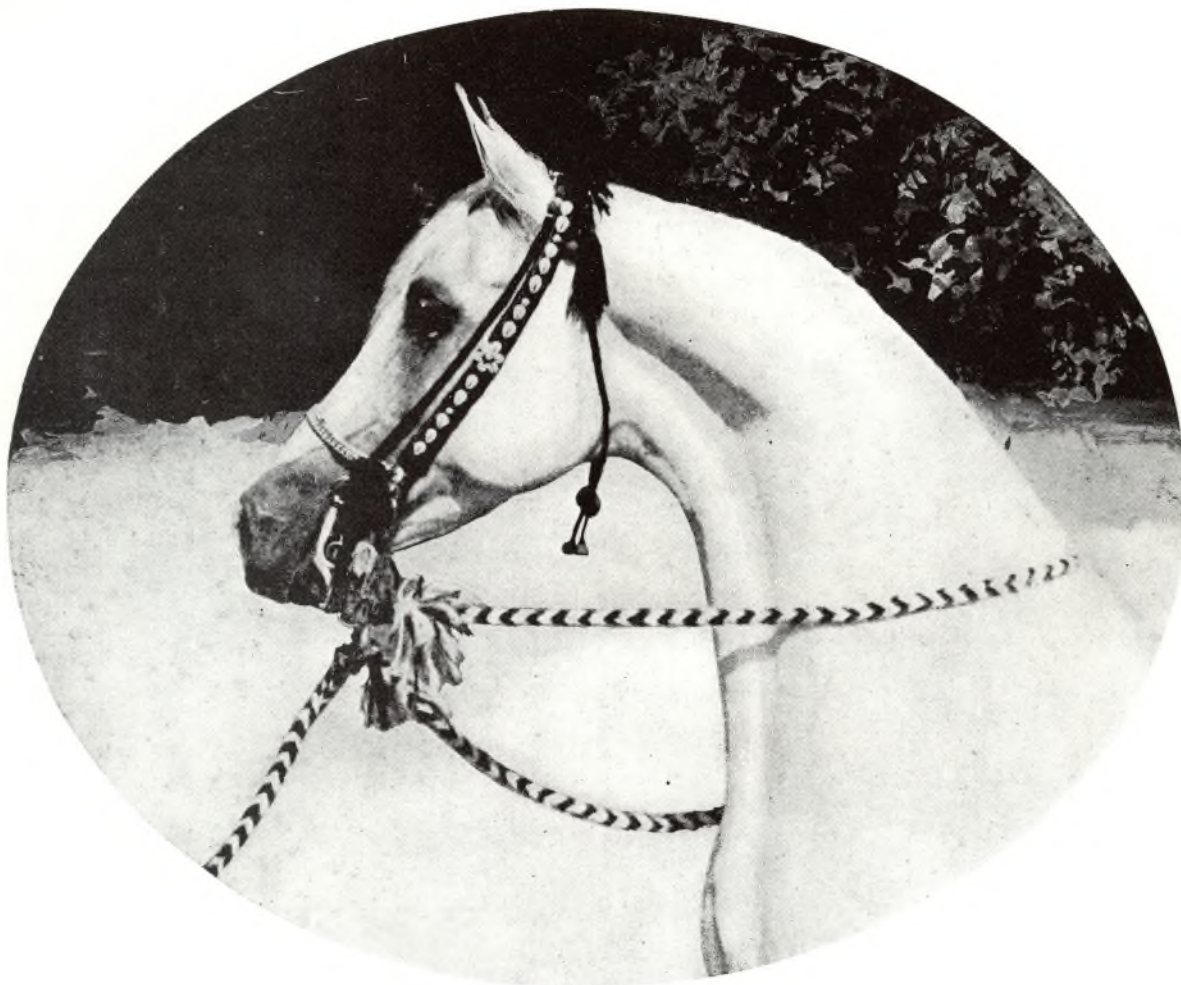

"INSPECTION BY APPOINTMENT ONLY"

It began for Roger A. Selby with those 4 words, a moment's curiosity, that blossomed into a lasting passion translating his pleasure with beauty into a productive life style.

A widely studied man with a growing international business and assorted hobbies, he "attacked" life with vigor, but nothing would prove as lastingly satisfying and gratifying to his sense of proportion as his involvement with the Arabian horse in America.

Excerpts from a letter he wrote best gives the setting:

"Although raised in a small city and not on a farm I had an early interest in horses. Before the turn of the century horses were the principal means of transportation. Before I was 10 years of age I had the exclusive care of a spirited driving horse and had him well trained in his duties. It was not until years later that I progressed to saddle horses, pleasure horses.

"In 1928 I made an extended visit to England on behalf of the foreign business of the Selby Shoe Co. While awaiting an appointment I idly leafed through a copy of the *English Field* magazine and was attracted by a small advertisement about one inch high of the Crabbet Arabian Stud, Crawley, Sussex. Most of the small space was occupied by a side view of a beautiful white Arabian stallion. I was intrigued by the only piece of copy, "Inspection by Appointment Only." The appointment took some doing. Old English mansion with an enclosed tennis court added,

green lawns and beautiful vistas in all directions. A veritable palace with the extensive stables off on one side. Lady Wentworth was constantly winning the highest prizes in the active competition in England and selling horses to all parts of the world. Her knowledge was encyclopedic. She was author of numerous ponderous and definitive tomes on the Arabian Horse and the English Thoroughbred Horse, the leading breeder of Arabians in the world.

"One was not permitted in the stables but I managed to slip in for a glimpse of the grand old patriarch, Skowronek, who looked fit but was too old to be led out for exhibition. Each horse was presented on the green terrace in front of the palatial tennis court enclosure. Every hair was in place. Questions were answered as to age, pedigree, etc., and here the key question of price and the usual answer 'that horse is not for sale.'

It took Dad several visits to successfully charm Lady Wentworth into a confidence that would allow him to import a group of her most representative bloodstock, including the prized desert bred *Mirage and supreme brood dam *Rifala.

In all 13 mares and 7 stallions came from Crabbet to Ohio between 1928 and 1932.

Roger Selby and Selby Stud were on their way.

What gave Selby Stud its strength? Simplistically perhaps, but to a point, originally pure stock with a strong breed quality and the courage to eliminate!

Dad first was attracted to the flashier ones not unlike the champion Saddlebreds he had raised and so successfully shown, which made Mirjani, Rehal, *Nurreddin II a source of excitement and pleasure for a time.

But you cannot grow as a breeder using assorted types and with females like the classically lovely *Kareyma, *Rifala, *Rose of France, *Rasmina as well as, of course, the stallions, *Mirage and *Raffles, a different pattern gained due attention.

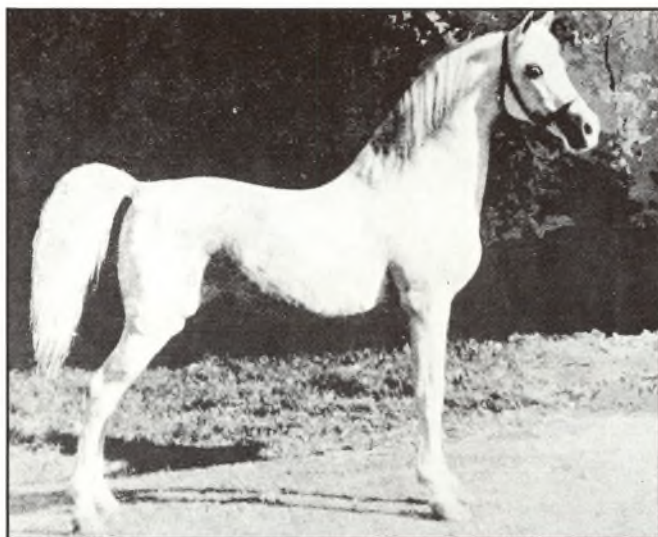
Of the nucleus came a program, others of the original group, though good horses, were not useful to this effort and were let go.

*Raffles soon proved to be a dominant reproductive type, abnormally prepotent. Now you could say the frosting was when we found the especially favorable blend of his crossing with *Mirage daughters (and particularly through Image, his son out of *Rifala, dam of *Raffles). Selby Stud had a production line, in addition to the direct dissemination to the country, of a dynamic reservoir of Skowronek blood by *Raffles himself.

The Skowronek type proved the most dynamic to carry a breeding program to a new country. Its inherent strength to correctness as well as type and beauty proved true as the years went by and Selby Stud horses populated the United States.

DESCENDENTS OF *RAFFLES

By Dr. Wm. Munson

Never, in the history of Arabian breeding, was there foaled a foal who was less likely to leave an imprint on the breed than *Raffles. He was bred by Lady Wentworth whose primary goal was to improve the size of this small desert breed, and he was incest-bred (being the result of a daughter to sire mating). Incest breeding was not then and is still not a popular method of breeding. *Raffles was used as an example of the dangers of in-breeding by many people. He was not used at stud in England and was presented to Roger Selby after the purchase of a group of horses from Lady Wentworth in 1932. There was a lapse of six years from the time of his importation until the birth of his first foal, Raffish, in 1938. Jimmie Dean was by then manager of the Selby Stud and, with encouragement from the noted author, historian, and expert on Arabian breeding, Carl Raswan, bred the Crabbet mares Rishafieh and *Indaia to him in 1937. When those two resultant foals hit the ground, *Raffles was on his way. The foal *Indaia produced from that mating was Indraff. This one foal insured *Raffles' immortality, but there was more to come.

There were 3 foals in 1939; Gina Manions' Rafissa and

the equally fine producing Rafina were in that group.

1940 produced a rash of Raffles foals — eight in all — remember, there were only 200 foals registered in 1940 so Raffles was gaining momentum. In that crop was the beautiful show horse Rafmirz, a national halter champion and great sire. Arraf, the greatest Arabian cutting horse we've had in the breed, was in this foal crop.

Two illustrious broodmares: Rafeyma, the dam of Raffey (incest bred to *Raffles) and Rafla, the dam of Rapture (incest bred to *Raffles) were in the 1941 crop of foals.

In all *Raffles produced 123 foals that were registered. Some were exported; some didn't produce. Four of his sons were gelded and of those four, three, namely; Arraf, Sanraff, and Riffles became three of the most famous performance horses the breed has produced!

The influence of *Raffles on American Arabians is so tremendous that I don't know how to assess it. His first son, Indraff, alone has produced the dams of 86 champions at last count. He's probably the leading sire of dams in the breed.

In the January 1983 stallion issue of the *Arabian Horse*

World, Sarah A. Wax gives us a list of the all time top siring stallions through Volume 41 of the Stud Book. There are 34 stallions who have sired at least 250 foals up to that point. Out of those 34, six — namely: Azraff, Sotep, Rafden, Garaff, Handeyraff, and Indr Raff are direct sons of *Raffles. Three: The Real McCoy, Comar Bay Beau, and Al-Marah Radames are grandsons. Gazon, Raffon, Synbad, and Gai Adventure are great grandsons and three of them: Raffon, Synbad, and Gai Adventure are National Halter Champions!

In the same issue of the *Arabian Horse World*, Mary Jane Parkinson makes a list of 86 sires of significance in the history of Arabian breeding worldwide. It is interesting to note how closely the *Raffles horses on this list correspond with the list on Sires of Significance. They are: Aarief and his son The Real McCoy; Azraff and his son Comar Bay Beau; Indr Raff and two sons Al-Marah Ibn Indr Raff and Al-Marah Radames; Garaff; Handeyraff, Rafden and Sotep.

Nobody has ever attempted to figure the contribution the *Raffles' daughters have made. They were the most uniformly beautiful group of mares in the United States. I did considerable judging in the forties and fifties so had the opportunity to know these mares very well. One winter, with time on my hands, I made a list of what I considered the best ten mares in America. There were six *Raffles mares on the list and four more in the next four places! They came along too late to figure prominently in national championships, but one of the youngest, Rose of Raswan, was Reserve National Champion Halter mare. She was first on 2 out of 3 judges' cards. Rose Marie was International Champion at Cuba. Flaia was the first National Champion at Greeley, Colorado.

Several Raffles' sons produced National Champions and/or had sons produce National Champions including Indr Raff, Imaraff, Azraff, and Garaff.

It might be interesting to note the mares who produced the most prominent *Raffles' families. These are not in order of importance but at random.

1. *Indaia out of Nisreen by Raseem — imported Crabbet

2. *Kareyma out of Julnar by Naseem — imported Crabbet
3. Aarah out of Nadirat by Ghadaf — Abbas Pasha — Crabbet
4. *Roda out of Negma by Monsour — Egyptian (paternal sister to Nazeer)
5. Rhodetta out of *Roda by Agwe — Crabbet Egyptian
6. Zareyna out of Kireyna by Zarife — Egyptian Crabbet — Davenport
7. Woengran out of Sybelle by Monsyn — Crabbet — Davenport
8. Imagida out of Ourida by Image — Crabbet — Huntington

This is a very incomplete account of the influence of *Raffles on American Arabians but as you can see, it would take a book to do it justice. Never has a horse had as much in-breeding and line-breeding done on his blood and, as the first breeder to breed a daughter of *Raffles to a son of *Raffles, I have inbred six generations without picking up a single bad gene attributable to *Raffles.

In a study made by Mary Jane Parkinson of U.S. National Champions for the years 1958 to 1981, there were 126 champions in stallion, mare and gelding halter; English pleasure; park, trail, cutting, hunter, native costume, jumper and pleasure driving. 92 of the champions were sired by Skowronek line stallions: Naseem 21, *Raffles 32 and *Raseyn 39.

86 national champions carried Skowronek through the mare lines.

To break it down: stallions 70%, mares 75%, gelding 94%, English pleasure 79%, Western pleasure 95%, park 53%, trail 93%, stock 87%, cutting 100%, hunter 100%, native costume 60%, jumper 100%, and pleasure driving 93%.

From 1958 to 1981, on a point basis in production of national champions, *Raffles is second with 350 points and *Raseyn fourth with 330. In 1981 at the Nationals at Albuquerque, 65% of the Reserve Champions carried *Raffles breeding.

DESCENDENTS OF *RASEYN

By Dr. Wm. Munson

*Raseyn by Skowronek out of Rayya was imported from Crabbet in 1926 by the Kellogg Ranch in California and died in 1952 at Alice Payne's ranch in Chino, California. He sired 135 foals who have had a spectacular influence on American Arabians.

*Raseyn's most important son was probably Ferseyn out of the Crabbet mare *Ferda. Ferseyn sired 40 champions and became famous as a sire of champion producing mares as well as stallions. In the list of top siring stallions, Ferseyn is ranked 30th with 250 foals which is very good considering the number of mares available. He sired Amerigo, a Reserve National Champion at halter who in turn sired Khemosabi who is 5th on the list of leading sires with 411 foals through volume 41 of the stud book. The Ferseyn son, Ferneyn sired Ferzon who sired Gazon on the all time list of leading sires and Gazon sired Raffon who is 6th on the list. This *Raseyn-Ferseyn-Ferneyn-Ferzon-Gazon-Raffon line of Skowronek horses is the longest line of sires of significance and top siring stallions that we have in our stud books. Ferseyn sired Fersara who enters into this picture as the dam of Ferzon. Fersara was also an undefeated champion at halter.

Frank and Helen McCoy produced one of the noted families of the breed by breeding Bint Sahara (Crabbet-Davenport) to Ferseyn and then line-breeding this cross. They produced the noted Ferzon by breeding Fersara to Ferneyn, both by Ferseyn. Bint Sahara is the leading brood matron of the breed with this Ferseyn nick. Fersara also produced leading sire, The Real McCoy by Raffles' son Aarief.

Other Ferseyn sons who have founded strong families are

Al Marah Safir; Amerigo — whose son Khemosabi is a double national champion and leading sire; El Gato; Regis, and Seneyn. Seneyn was inbred very heavily and successfully by Rich Whitmore at Salt Lake City, Utah. His son, Camelot, sired Kontiki who set records at distances from 6 furlongs to 2 miles besides winning championships at halter.

Another very important son of *Raseyn was Sureyn out of *Crabbet Sura, a daughter of Skowronek. Unfortunately, he never had a chance to sire a pure bred foal until Edna Draper got hold of him at age 17. When the national championship classes were started in Estes Park, Colorado, he had the National Champion son, Mujahid and National Champion daughter, Surita. He later produced Reserve National Champion Saneyn, as well as National Champion Sura Joy, Mi Fanci and a National Champion Gelding. The Sureyn horses are noted for their good hips, hindquarters and legs.

Other well-known sons of *Raseyn include Ronek, Courier, Rasakkla, Moneyn, Pomona Ahmen. His daughters nicked well with a variety of out-cross horses. Angyl out of imported *Chloe produced Bay Abi, a National Halter Champion for Sheila Varian who has founded a dynasty of his own through Bay El Bay. Both Bay Abi and Bay El Bay are in the list of top siring stallions.

On a point basis in the production of national champions in the U.S.A., *Raseyn is fourth with 330 points. 39 U.S. National Champions have been sired by *Raseyn line stallions in the years 1958 through 1981.

THE KELLOGG CHAPTER

*Raseyn, *Ferda and *Nasik, along with eleven other Crabbet Arabians, stepped from the American freighter, Minnewaska, onto the dock in New York. It was spring of 1926. The first leg of the journey from England was to be followed by a trip in a railroad car, across the continental United States, to the newly-founded Kellogg Stud in Pomona, California. It is not likely that anyone could have foretold the influence these three horses and their fellow equine immigrants would bring to Arabian horse breeding in 20th century America.

The most acclaimed member of this early Crabbet delegation was the Skowronek son, *Raswan. His untimely, if not infamous death, before siring any foals at the Kellogg Ranch was an inconsolable tragedy, not soon compensated by the later triumphs of the other Crabbet imports. Fortunately, *Raswan had sired a few foals while still at the Crabbet Stud. His daughter, the influential *Rose of France, was imported by Roger Selby some years later.

The Kellogg Ranch was founded in 1925 by American breakfast cereal magnate and humanitarian, W.K. Kellogg. Fulfilling a childhood dream, Kellogg afforded a breeding program which rivaled the great studs of the world in scope and which provided a showcase for the Arabian horse unprecedented in the history of the breed. The "Sunday Shows" became an institution in themselves, providing the opportunity for the Arabian horse to be viewed by thousands of the American public. This exposure of the Arabian horse at his best and in roles heretofore unknown in the breed did much to make the horse accessible, if not desirable, to the average person.

W.K. Kellogg's boyhood dreams were no doubt rekindled by his first ranch manager, Carl Raswan (nee Schmidt). An incurable romantic, Raswan was steeped in Arabic tradition and a knowledge of the horse of the Bedouins paralleled only by the Blunts themselves. It was, in fact, Raswan who personally selected the horses for Kellogg's first importation from the Crabbet Stud.

Raswan was replaced by Herbert H. Reese as ranch manager in 1927. As much as Raswan was a romantic, Reese was a dogged pragmatist — a horseman with the finest credentials and reputation of his day. Reese and Raswan both shared that undefinable, yet all-important "eye" for Arabian type and beauty. Reese piloted the Kellogg Ranch through the golden years of the 1930's. Looking back, it was the combination of romanticism and pragmatism — those particular passions brought to the Kellogg Ranch by each man — which accounted for its success.

Over the next decade Reese took these first Crabbet

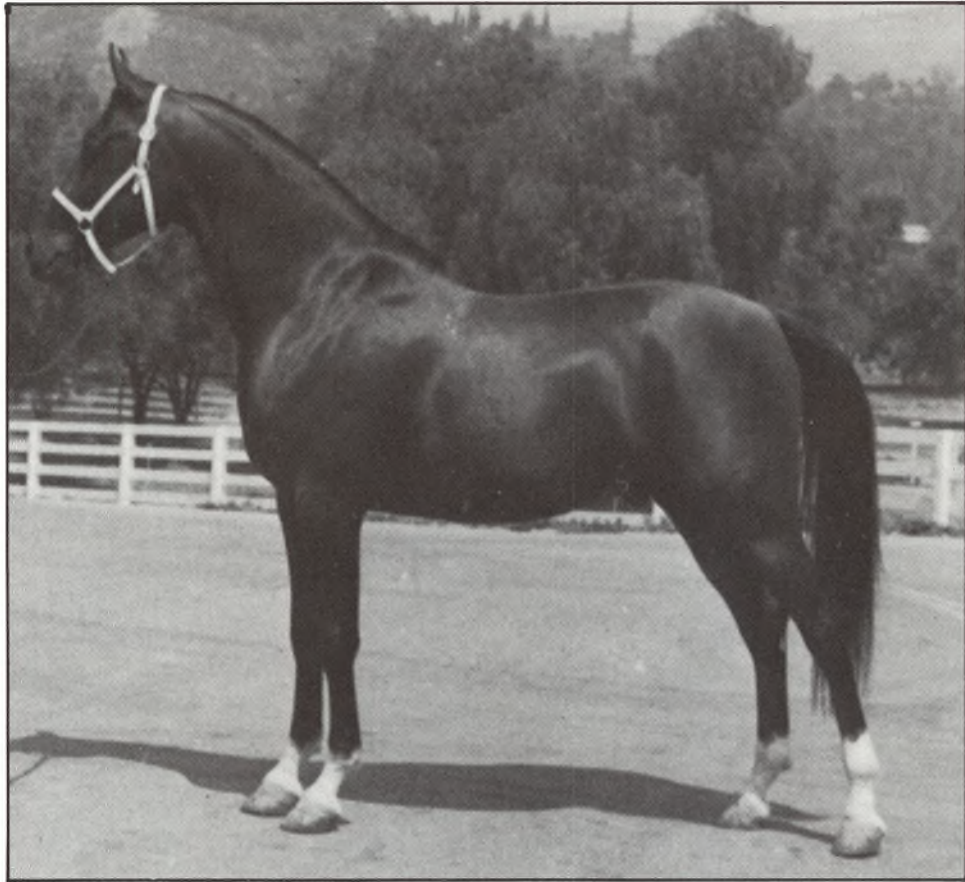
imports as veritable loaves and fishes and multiplied their influence. By 1937, nearly half of the horses on the ranch traced to *Ferda — already thirteen years of age at the time of the importation. Lady Wentworth's gift to W.K. Kellogg, *Nasik, was imported at the age of eighteen. He enjoyed an illustrious ten-year career at the Kellogg Ranch as a sire and as breed ambassador, and as the ranch's early-day media star. *Raseyn founded a dynasty rivaled only by the other Skowronek son in the east — *Raffles.

Along the way, Reese added to the first importation, securing horses of Crabbet breeding from the Maynesboro Stud; the lease of *Rahal by *Nureddin II from the Selby Stud; and the second direct importation from the Crabbet Stud in 1936 of three mares.

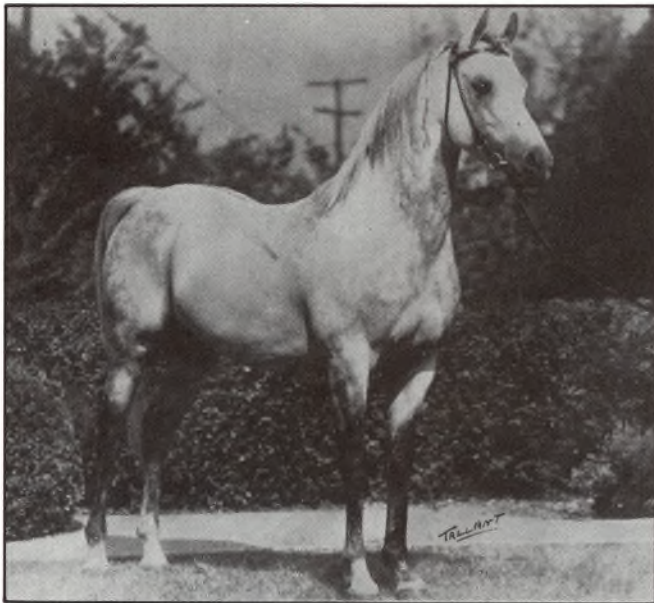
The incorporation of the Maynesboro horses which included Rabiyyat, Roshana, Bakmal, Bazikh, Rabiyyas, Rayik, Raad, Nusara and Ghazayat, among others, brought a powerful infusion of the Azrek line, noted for its spectacular trotting ability. Important lines which had died out at the Crabbet Stud, such as that of *Abu Zeyd (Lal-i-Abdar) and Bint Helwa were preserved in the Maynesboro group. Of perhaps the greatest consequence, was the introduction of the breeding and type of the American-bred *Astrald son, Gulastra, via his grandson, Rabiyyas.

The 1936 importation from the Crabbet Stud, though small in number, was gigantic in consequence to American breeding. *Rissletta by Naseem X Risslina; *Sura (renamed *Crabbet Sura); and *Incoronata, both Skowronek daughters, comprised the importation. Had *Rissletta only produced Abu Farwa, her broodmare career would have been legendary; likewise *Crabbet Sura's production of the *Raseyn son, Sureyn, who founded his own dynasty of champions after a late start at stud, earned her a place in history. *Incoronata, a daughter of the Crabbet mare, Nisreen, though not rivaling the other two mares in influence, bred down with significance. Her son, Nataf, by Farana was a particularly stunning individual.

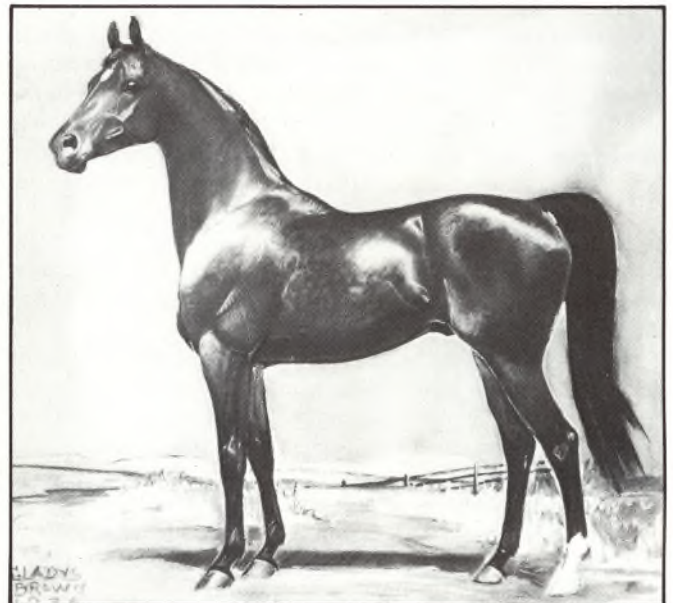
Sadly, it would seem that the era of the Kellogg Ranch; of its magnificent Spanish stables, fountains, palm trees, picturesque gardens and pastures is gone. Such human projects belonged to a genre of American industrialists in the 1920's. The empty stable is now part of the campus of a California technical university. Modern buildings and parking lots dominate the once pastoral setting. The original Kellogg Arabians are, of course, long dead, but unlike the human projects, they are reborn through their descendants; their splendor prevails.



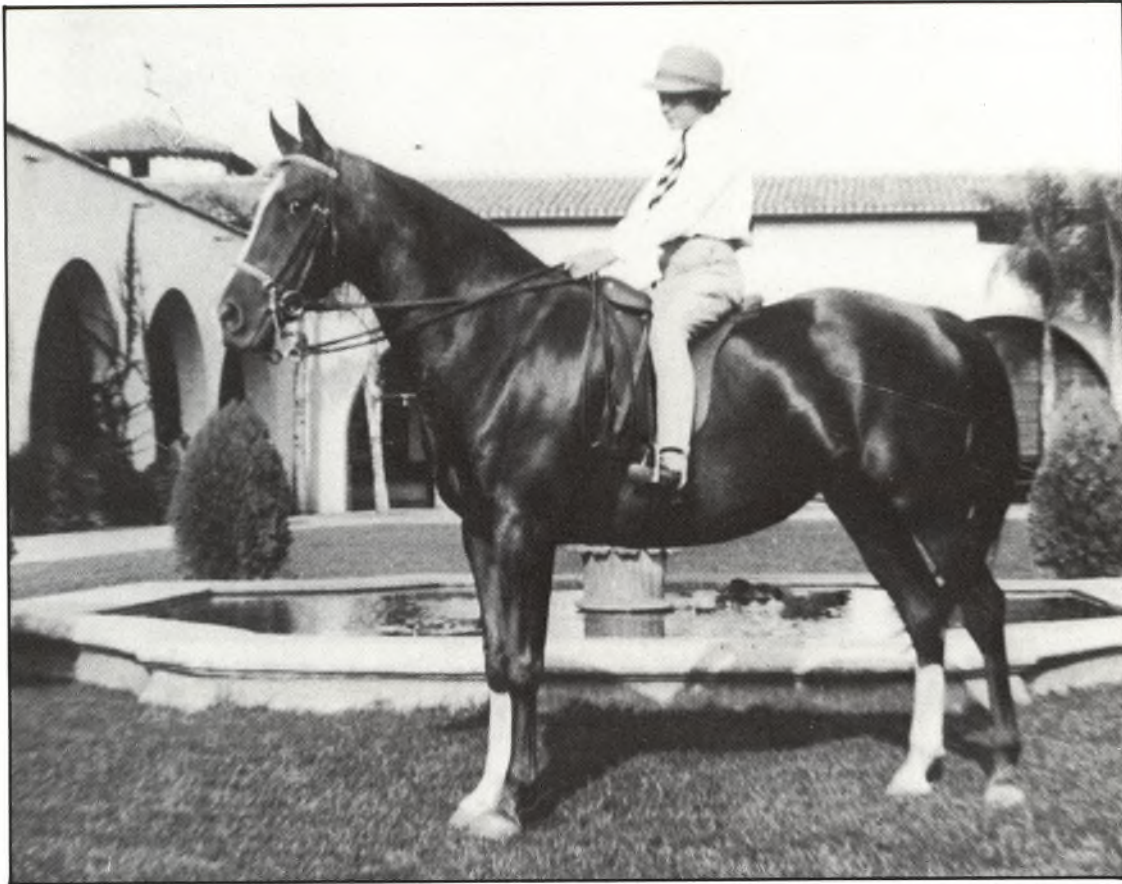

THE ABU FARWA LEGACY

December 1961, one wonderfully sunny California day, I saw Abu Farwa for the first time. At 21 years of age, Ab was a legend, larger than life, one of the pillars of the Arabian Breed in America. To a 12 year old boy whose childhood heroes were more often four-legged than not, this day was momentous. Meeting Abu Farwa — seeing him in the flesh — regal, commanding, electric — no one sees more than a few such horses in a lifetime. Holding his lead-shank and patting his sleek, muscled neck was an experience still vivid these 22 years hence.

Perhaps no American bred horse typified the Crabbet Heritage more than did Abu Farwa. Specifically, no American bred horse carried forward the Mesaoud/Rodania type and character into American breeding with such widespread influence. However, as much as the Crabbet heritage was typified in this single, great Arabian stallion, Abu Farwa was unique — one of a handful of those rare individuals of the Arabian breed to establish a recognized type which predominates in his descendents.

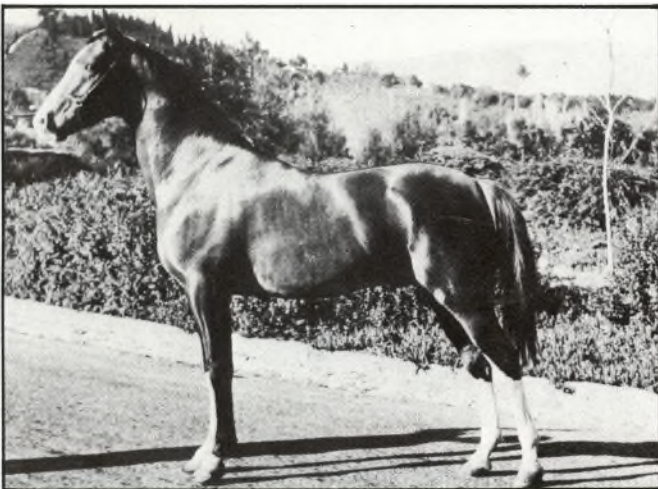
The Abu Farwa type did not come forth from a vacuum. Rather it represents a unique, but clearly identifiable combination of the superior qualities of his Crabbet ancestry. These characteristics combined to become a remarkably dominant genetic force.

The most superficial pedigree analysis of Abu Farwa casts him as the leading progenitor of the *Astraled branch of the Mesaoud sire line. Abu Farwa's female line is that of Rodania, whose influence was no less formulative to his genetic heritage and make-up. Because Mesaoud and Rodania occur repeatedly throughout his pedigree, their characteristics and influence are strengthened rather than diluted in subsequent generations. The "N" mares in his pedigree, Nasra and her half sister Narghileh, carry their own definable influence in the make-up of the Abu Farwa type. The presence of Skowronek through Abu Farwa's grandsire, Naseem, also represents a small but significant pedigree influence which again can be identified with certain characteristics present in Abu Farwa.

It cannot be stated too strongly that pedigree influences do not have a life of their own apart from identifiable characteristics of specific horses. To be relevant, they must carry forward in a given pedigree. That is to say pedigree studies must be validated by direct observation to bear any real meaning. The Abu Farwa type can only be fully understood in this context.

Abu Farwa strongly resembled his dam, *Rissletta — probably more than he resembled his sire, Rabiya. *Rissletta was considered — unquestionably — the most beautiful mare imported from the Crabbet Stud to the Kellogg Ranch. *Rissletta, along with the similarly bred *Rifala, who was imported to the Selby Stud, brought the Rissla female line to America, giving it lasting importance and influence here. This line is remarkable for its classic quality and extravagant motion, and the special ability to produce great sons — as exemplified by Abu Farwa, *Raffles, Rissalix, Irex. It is through *Rissletta's dam Risslina that the Rissla female line is most strongly represented in England today. Abu Farwa bore a great resemblance to Risslina, her influence carrying forward strongly through his descendents. It is from *Rissletta's sire, Naseem, however that Abu Farwa inherited his particular magnificence of forehead — a trademark of the genuine Abu Farwa type.

Abu Farwa's sire, Rabiya, was considered by H.H. Reese, Kellogg's long-time manager and the master engineer of that breeding program, to have been one of the best sires of the Kellogg Ranch. The Maynesboro bred Rabiya was said by Reese to be the ideal nick between the Gulastra son, Rahas, and the magnificent trotting mare, Rabiya. Rabiya in particular bore a strong resemblance to Rahas, who in turn, bore a strong resemblance to his sire, Gulastra, a son of *Astraled. The striking similarity between individuals carries forward to include Abu Farwa and his descendents. These horses represented the finest qualities of what is termed "ideal saddle type." Indeed the accomplishments of the line in all endeavors which require athletic

proWess, shine with unequalled brilliance. Such is the heritage of which Abu Farwa himself was most pre-possessing and which also has come to characterize the Abu Farwa type today.

*Nasik is yet another pedigree influence to be recognized as a part of the make-up of Abu Farwa. Lady Wentworth described *Nasik as "magnificent, with style and quality to a superlative degree." Reese termed him "unbeatable when it came to animation." *Nasik's name occurs twice in Abu Farwa's pedigree via Rafeef, the sire of Risslina, and *Rokhsa, the dam of Rabiyyat. It is from *Nasik (as well as from *Astraled) that Abu Farwa seems to have inherited his lofty, upright carriage of forehead, his style and electric presence — the latter characteristic particularly identifiable with the horses of the "N" line at the Crabbet Stud.

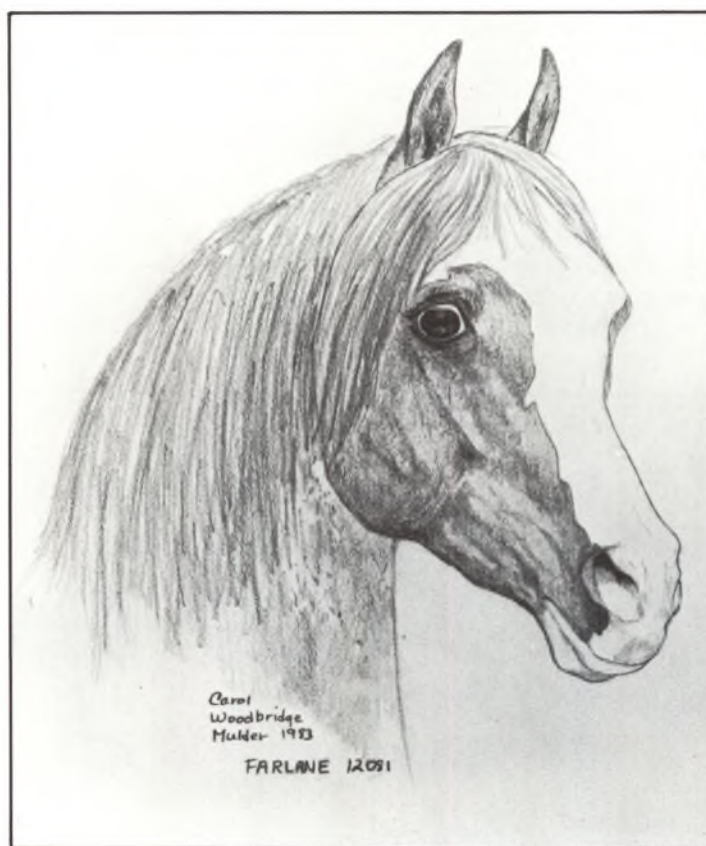
It is apparent in the final analysis of Abu Farwa's Crabbet heritage that the characteristics for which he and his line are noted: magnificence of forehead, style, animation, presence, athletic prowess, structural excellence — occurred in multiple rather than singular instances in his pedigree. One would expect to observe that these characteristics would breed on with predominance and consistency. And they do.

In his life-time Abu Farwa sired 278 foals. Of these, 220 were chestnut — fitting tribute to a sire whose name means "father of chestnuts." Abu Farwa, as well as a number of his sons became leading sires of champions in North America. The list of National champions in halter and performance credited to these sires is formidable. Yet Abu Farwa bred down with equal excellence via a proportionately large number of his lesser known sons and daughters. These horses were perhaps not as widely recognized, but their

individual excellence and breeding ability were certainly of equal value to the propagation of the Abu Farwa line.

Today, Abu Farwa horses are a distinct breeding group, representing a singular though not unrelated genre of authentic Crabbet breeding and type. While the Abu Farwa influence has been pervasive in American breeding for several decades, its numbers are miniscule when viewed in the context of the present day Arabian horse population which numbers in the hundreds of thousands. Those breeders who continue to breed Abu Farwa horses do so by use of both linebreeding and by a wide variety of out-crosses, which, for the most part, have not subsumed the Abu Farwa identity. The best of the Abu Farwa horses demonstrate that both outcrossing and linebreeding carry equal merit. Abu Farwa breeding has been favorably shown to be compatible with a great many of the other Crabbet influences as well as the non-Crabbet influences. In certain instances, horses of a unique but nonetheless desirable type are the result. The Polish/Abu Farwa cross is an example of the latter.

Projecting to the years ahead, it would seem that the continuation of the Abu Farwa type and character is inextricably intertwined with the continuation — the survival — of the authentic Crabbet influence and breeding tradition. If breeders are judicious in both their goals and their practices — if those who own and breed Abu Farwa horses today, do so with both hindsight and foresight, giving as much study and thought to the generations of the future as is given to generations past, then the contribution made by Abu Farwa will compare to that of his illustrious Crabbet forebearers of the last one hundred years.

Aurab was a chestnut stallion foaled in August of 1957, a representative of the splendid old Crabbet type which comes to us through horses imported to Maynesboro and the Kellogg Ranch. Those of us who knew Aurab remember him as a tall and imposing horse, quietly dignified at home but capable of displaying thrilling presence when on show. Aurab was practically a model of balanced riding conformation, with excellent bone and substance. His shoulders, and the way his neck was set on his shoulders, were outstandingly good. Perhaps the most dramatic of all Aurab's qualities was his brilliant natural action at the trot, which was made even more impressive by the way he carried himself in motion. Aurab was unforgettable, and it still seems scarcely possible that he died in May of 1978.

No one has improved on the words of the late Lady Anne Lytton: "I shall never forget the impression he made on me — no horse has done that since my judgment matured; his proportions were so perfect."

Aurab's majestic bearing seems to be a heritage of the Rifnas line; his sire Aulani was a son of that Kellogg-bred horse, himself the offspring of two of the 1926 Crabbet imports, *Nasik and *Rifla. The dam of Aulani was Follyat, a tall spare chestnut bred at Mrs. Erdman's Folly Ranch in Wyoming. Her parents were Babyat and Fenzileh, both bred at Maynesboro. Follyat passed briefly through the Kellogg Ranch. The Ranch's distinguished manager, H. H. Reese, chose Follyat when he left Kellogg's and was given his pick

of the Ranch's mares. Follyat produced Aulani and his excellent half-brother Ziyadi for Reese. Her daughters Follyanna (dam of Muhuli) and Folly also bred on successfully.

Aulani was Follyat's first foal and was the same age as the great Abu Farwa, bought as a colt by Reese. Perhaps there wasn't room in the Reese stables for two tall upstanding chestnuts. At any rate, Aulani came to be owned by K. D. Mathiot, a long-established Monterey, California breeder of Palomino horses. Aulani was Mathiot's parade horse, a designation which may not make its proper impression without some background. The mounted parade was no minor California institution; it was a highly visible aspect of the state's old Spanish tradition of horsemanship. The Palominos in silver-mounted tack we see nowadays in the Tournament of Roses parade are a relic of an old and honorable style of riding which was once much more widely followed. Doubtless in the early days the parade horse of Sunday was the working stock horse of the rest of the week, but with the passage of time a higher degree of showmanship called for a different style of horse. We are not talking about parade classes, in those days before all-Arabian shows, but about several hours' march in the California sun on a paved street under heavy tack. Through it all the horse was expected to remain high-headed and impressive but to behave faultlessly. This is not a light assignment, and may be considered quite a good test of a horse's ability to combine

beauty with substance and trainability. It is no wonder Arabians became popular as parade mounts.

The showiest horses, ridden by the most flamboyant caballeros, would earn reputations outside their home regions as they traveled to the major parades. Such apparently was the case with Aulani, enabling him to attract mares from the Hurlbutts' Calarabia Stud. The Mathiot mares were all Palominos, so Aulani would not have left purebred descent without the Hurlbutts' intervention. K.D. Mathiot came to own two purebred Aulani foals through lease arrangements with Hurlbutt: the black filly Coalani and the chestnut colt Aurab.

Aulani did not sire many purebreds but there were others of note besides Aurab. Narlani, full brother to Coalani, was himself not used for purebred breeding until well struck in years, but sired good stock for the Moores of Chico, Cal. Carlani, from the half-Polish Hurlbutt mare Carlia, was a Top Ten halter champion and a successful sire for the Whitmores in Utah. Koloni, bred by Howard Marks, also went to Utah to the Christoffersons; her most distinguished foal was the National Champion English pleasure mare, Elna. There were other good individuals which have bred on well.

Aurab's dam Rabna was one of three full siblings bred in northern California and sold to the Hurlbutts. Their parents, Narzigh and Rabkhal, were respectively the high-selling stallion and mare at an early auction sale at the Hearst ranch at San Simeon. Narzigh was a tall flaxen chestnut by the Maynesboro sire Ghazi and out of the Kellogg mare Nafara, one of the ten full siblings which included Farana, Sikin, Treyf, Narasa and Farnasa. Rabkhal's sire Rehal was also a Maynesboro head sire; he was best known for his daughters Rabiyyat and Ghazayat. Rabkhal's dam Rabk was one of the famed Gulastra daughters, and her dam was Rabiyyat.

The eldest sibling was the stallion Narab, who gained a

following by living to be 37 but seems to have outlived his deserved reputation as a beautiful individual and a very good sire. The next foal, Ghanzi, produced the top cutting horse Zita, dam in turn of National High Score Gelding Wirtetz. Narzigh mares have bred on especially well, and his is now the strongest close line of descent from Ghazi. Rabkhal's family is a good one, her other offspring including Zitez and the beautiful (and influential) Sue-Ez.

Rabna herself was a blocky flaxen chestnut, apparently chosen to balance Aulani's extra scope. The combination could scarcely have turned out any better.

Aurab was retained by Mathiot as Aulani's replacement, but in his owner's old age he came to be owned by Grace Evans Baker of Aromas, Cal. Mrs. Baker put her new 13-year-old horse in training with Jeff Wonnell. Aurab was scarcely the usual age to start a show career, but he became a champion park horse in top competition and won the formal driving class at Scottsdale to great acclaim. Aurab was later Pacific Slope Champion in formal driving shown by Evelyn Bach.

Aurab's breeding career also got off to a slow start; his one purebred from the Mathiot years is Ed Hubbert's splendid Ben Rabba, whose dam is a daughter of Coalani. Under Mrs. Baker's ownership Aurab got close to 100 purebred foals, which are showing and breeding on with distinction in their turn. A son who should have been at the Symposium was Magic Aurab, out of the Indian Magic mare *Flying Storm. This horse compiled a brilliant record in English classes through the National level for his owner-breeders, the Gelles' of Reno, Nev. Other Top Ten Aurab performers include Ben Rabba, the Prines' Hi Voltage, and the Peaks' Aur Twan.

Inspired by the late Lady Anne Lytton's enthusiasm, Mrs. J. H. Paine of the Bodwell Stud leased Ben Rabba for two seasons, thus returning Aurab's Crabbet heritage to its English home.

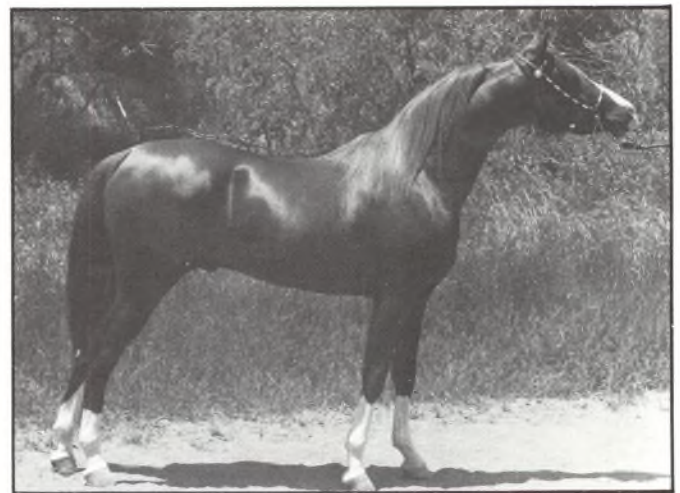

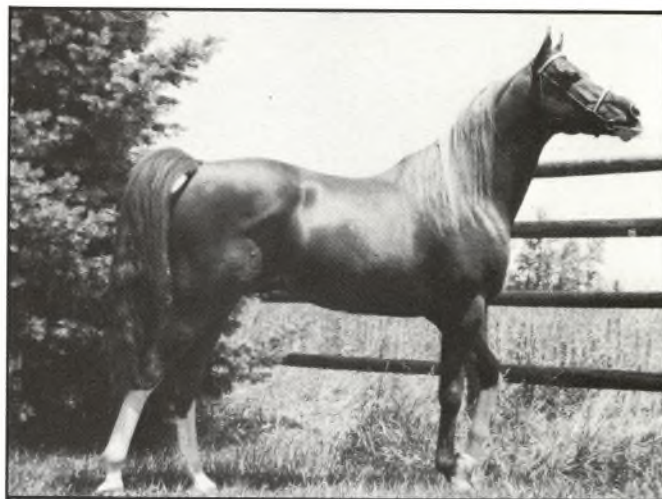

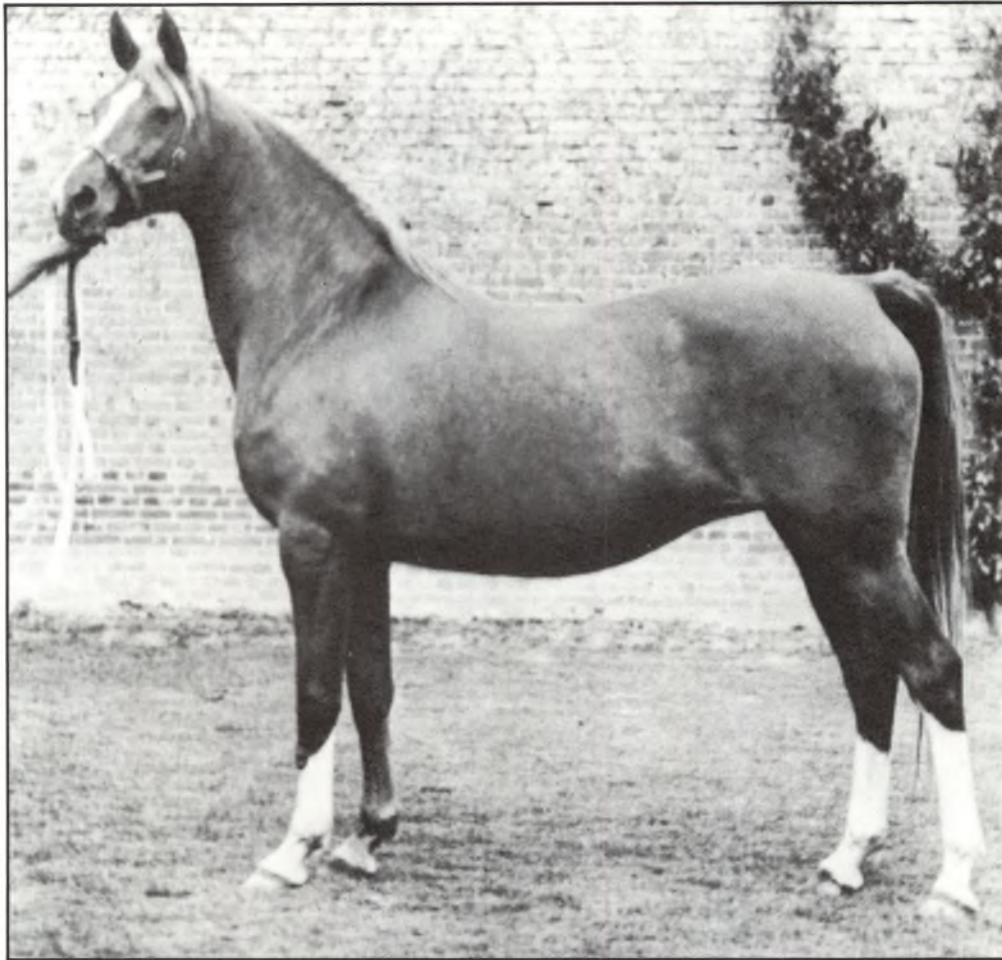

THE LONG AFTERNOON OF CRABBET

The Crabbet Arabian Stud came to an end in 1972 with the death of Indian Magic. The Crabbet Arabians will have no end, as long as the breed endures. The international scope of the Crabbet influence is reflected in the many aspects of the Crabbet story presented here today. This gathering is part of that story: The World Symposium at once symbolizes and ensures the immortality of Crabbet.

The history of a stud is properly the story of the horses, but many of us first approached the Crabbet horses through the agency of a single larger-than-life personality. The stud was founded by the Blunts, but we learned of them through the writings of their daughter Judith Anne Dorothea, Sixteenth Baroness Wentworth — in her own phrase, “The Lady Wentworth of Crabbet Park.” The last chapter of Lady Wentworth’s life was an important part of the story of Crabbet, and saw the development of a consistent stamp, the Modern Crabbet Arab. I hope to give here a feeling for the importance and influence of that kind of horse, and of Crabbet during the last years of Lady Wentworth.

I will date the Modern Crabbet period from 1937. The stud up to that time was in perpetual transition: numbers were large, the genetic base was wide, and horses were sold in large groups to found or to develop important satellite studs. These sales were essential to the continued existence of the Crabbet Stud itself. W. R. Brown had the Maynesboro imports in 1918. Nineteen Crabbet Arabs went to the Royal Agricultural Society Stud in Egypt in 1920. W. K.

Kellogg’s Pomona Ranch had an important group in 1926 and three key mares ten years later. Roger Selby’s Crabbet foundation was laid by 1932. Baron Bicker and the Duque de Veragua took smaller numbers of important horses to Poland and Spain. Twenty-five horses went to the Russian Government Stud at Tersk in 1936, the last great single sale in Lady Wentworth’s lifetime. It was from the nucleus retained after this sale that Modern Crabbet was to grow.

Crabbet had no near rival, but the Crabbet breeding tradition in England was already larger than a single stud. The English Arab was based on Crabbet breeding, and a small group of studs preserved influences which were lost at Crabbet itself. None of these breeders had the head start — or the unique qualities of personality — to become a Lady Wentworth, but we rightly prize today the aspects of the Crabbet heritage we owe to them. More to the point of this narrative, Lady Wentworth exchanged stock with these studs in a limited way, and reinfused into Modern Crabbet certain elements she felt could be useful.

First must come Lady Yule’s Hanstead. It was not the oldest historically, but it surely was England’s most influential Crabbet nursery, second only to the source stud itself. Lady Yule bought mares from Crabbet and was one of the few breeders allowed to use the Crabbet sires, although not all the Hanstead horses were entirely of Crabbet ancestry. Surely the central force in fixing what has come to us as the Hanstead type was Rissalix, bought from Lady

Wentworth but irrevocably associated today with Hanstead, where he got *Count Dorsaz, Mikeno and Blue Domino. For some years there was an exchange agreement between Crabbet and Hanstead; the most important individuals to come to Crabbet out of this were very important ones indeed, Raktha and Oran, the two most used Modern Crabbet sires.

As there came to be distinctive Hanstead and Modern Crabbet horses, so H.V. Musgrave Clark's Courthouse Stud produced the Clark type. Courthouse was founded on Crabbet stock in the main, but had unique influences through three desertbred stallions imported after the First World War. Doubtless the chief responsibility for the uniqueness of Mr. Clark's horses lies with their owner's definite ideas on type and Arabian character. The Polish Skowronek stood first at Courthouse before finding his way to Crabbet; Lady Wentworth, and all of us, had reason to be grateful to Mr. Clark.

Smaller studs responsible for individuals of international importance included G.H. Ruxton's Craven Lodge, where non-Crabbet lines were influential. The only non-Crabbet ancestors in Modern Crabbet come through the Craven Lodge colt Dargee, bought as a yearling and first used at stud in 1949. He carried crosses to the non-Crabbet desertbreds Dwarka (twice), Mootrub, El Emir and Ishtar. Dargee proved a fine breeding influence though his worth was not fully appreciated until after Lady Wentworth's death.

At Miss May Lyon's Harwood Stud, Arabs were bred to performance standards and the female line of the Blunts' journey mare Hagar was maintained.

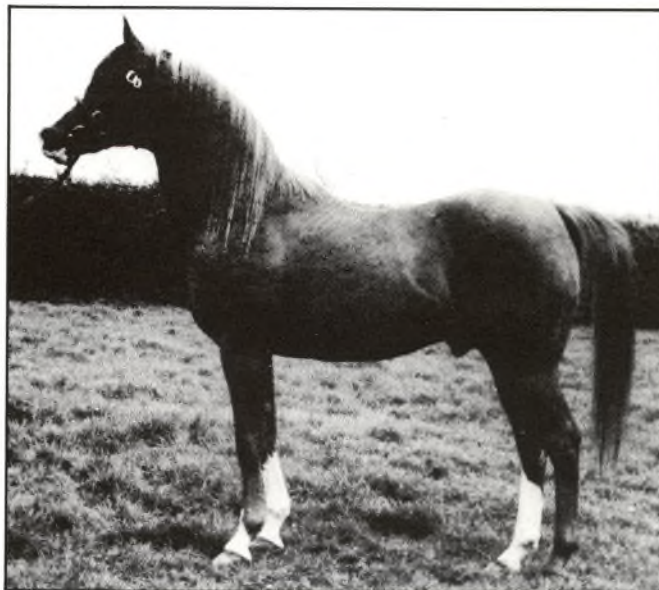
Mrs. E.M. Murray's Foxbury Stud was founded on the great mare Risslina, dam at Crabbet of *Rissletta and *Rosanthus (the former a key mare at the Kellogg Ranch, the latter a source of elegance in American Arabians). Her important foals for Mrs. Murray were Rifari and Risira, and the latter mare's daughter by Rissalix returned a prized double Rissla line to Crabbet. This was Nerina, and her chief Crabbet foals were both by Oran: Noran (sire of Achim for Dr. Houtappel, and of the international show jumper Rex The Robber), and Nerinora, who never produced a filly but gave many important sons.

Mr. W. Hay's Winestead Hall was the home of Silver Fire's daughter Somara, and the Silver type quite overwhelmed the Rish influences of Rangoon and *Rithan. Two full sisters by Rangoon out of Somara came back to Crabbet; the more significant one was *Silver Crystal, and her most important foal before her sale to John Rogers was *Silwa.

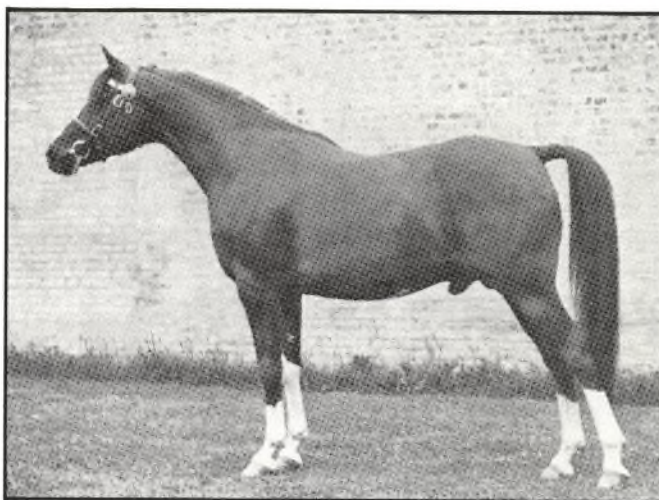
Other studs certainly deserve to be more than footnotes to a history which the limitations of time and space forbid our exploring further. It is equally impossible to list all the horses of international significance, foaled at Crabbet between 1937 and 1958. What follows should be thought of as an attempt to touch on a few highlights of what amounts to an international roll call of major breeding horses.

Sharima, Silver Fire and the filly Indian Crown were already at Crabbet in 1937, and Sharima produced her most influential daughter Sharfina in that year, the last foal of Rytham in England. Lady Wentworth bred from a number of mare lines, but she found the descendants of this set of mares to be her favorites — they are truly the Modern Crabbet Arabs.

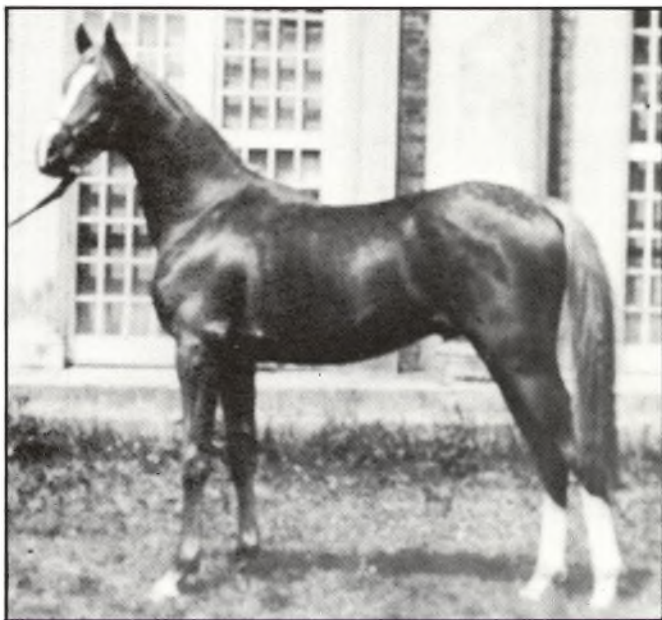
The stallion third in use to Raktha and Oran during our study period was Indian Gold; he was indeed a constant of Modern Crabbet and was used from 1937 through 1955.

His chief sons were *Rosanthus and *Sun Royal, but his daughters were his treasures. Had he gotten only Silver Fire's daughter Silver Gilt and the full sisters *Serafina and Silfina from Sharfina he would have been one of the breed's most influential sires.

Indian Gold's half-sister Indian Crown produced her most important foal in "that prince of horses," Indian Magic by Raktha. It may be that his is the image most readily called to mind by the phrase "Modern Crabbet." Raktha also got Grey Royal from Sharima, and this proved the second most important of that mare's daughters. She bred important sons in *Royal Diamond and Royal Crystal. A second pair of full sisters from Sharfina, this time by Rissam rather than Indian Gold, were *Shades of Night and Shalina. They produced the important blood-sisters Dancing Sunlight and Sirella by Dargee, among other quality stock. Neither an Indian nor a Royal, but surely a prince of the Nasra family, was *Nizzam, son of Rissam and Nezma. He was sold to Mr. McConnell and then to Dr. Houtappel, and his influence is widespread.

Grand Royal, Sharima's son by Oran, was one of Lady Wentworth's most prized stallions. He was an imposing individual, but time has not proven him a breeding influence in the class of his three-quarters brother *Royal Diamond. Still, he got stock in England and Australia which cannot be ignored, including Silver Gilt's daughters *Silver Grand and *Silver Diamond.

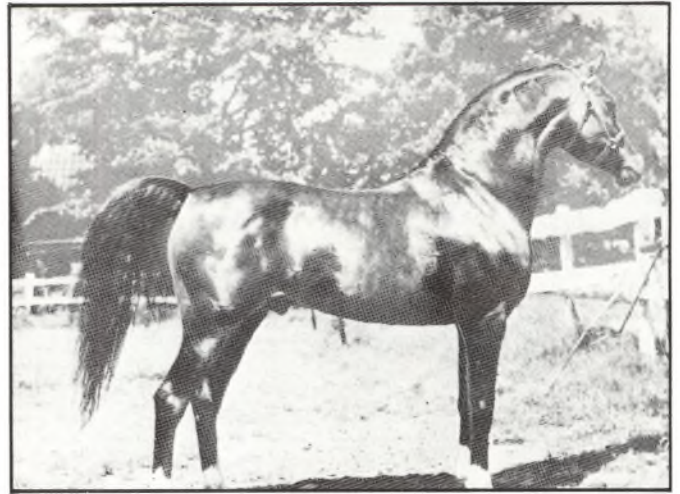
*Serafina and Silfina were superlative producers. The former is surely best known for her Raktha son *Serafix, chief sire for John Rogers and for years the leading sire of halter champions in the U.S. His full brother *Silver Drift got only one foal at Crabbet, but this was Spindrif, sire of major champions in Australia. *Silver Drift was a ridden champion in England and was a good sire in this country, still influential in the Karho program. Silfina's produce, like her sister's, are influential in England, North America and Australia. Two sons were especially important down under: Electric Silver by Raktha died young of snakebite but still bred on well, and his half-brother Sindh by *Silver Vanity became an overwhelmingly influential sire.

Practically every foal of Silver Fire has bred on well somewhere, but Silver Gilt was unquestionably the matriarch of the line at Crabbet. Her daughters Silverlet by Raktha and Royal Radiance by *Royal Diamond left fine legacies in South Africa and Australia and the international sire of the clan was her Oran son *Silver Vanity. He was himself a sire of champions in England and America, and his sons carried all before them in Australia and South Africa. Silver Gilt's best daughter was probably Silver Grey by *Royal Diamond, British National Champion and exceptional producer.

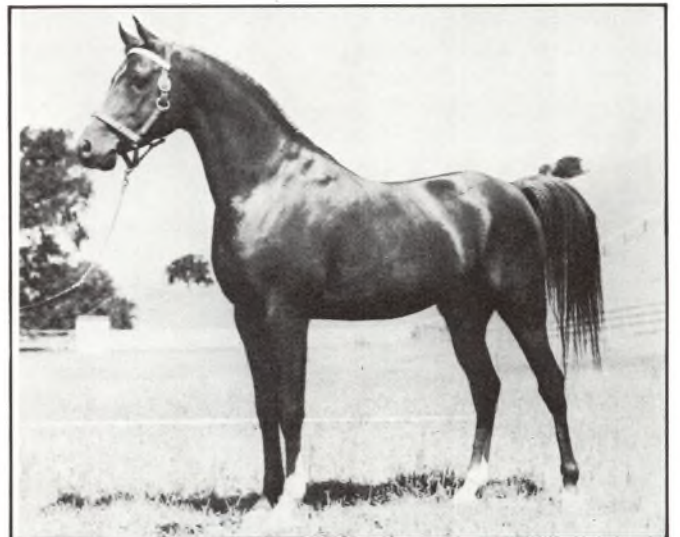
Dargee crossed well with all the mare lines. During Lady Wentworth's lifetime he sired the important breeding animals Royal Crystal (a major sire in South Africa), Silwan and Crystal Fire (both important in Australia), *Silwara (a Lasma foundation mare), and four key matrons in recent English pedigrees: Dancing Sunlight, Incoronetta, Rissalma II and Sirella.

The Krushieh mare Dafina, imported in 1927 from Ibn Saoud and dam of a line foundress in the Russian sale group, was not at Crabbet during our period. Her influence did linger until 1938 and the sale of her daughter Dafinetta by Naziri to Mr. Guinness, now Lord Moyne. Dafina's family is another which has become international in its branches.

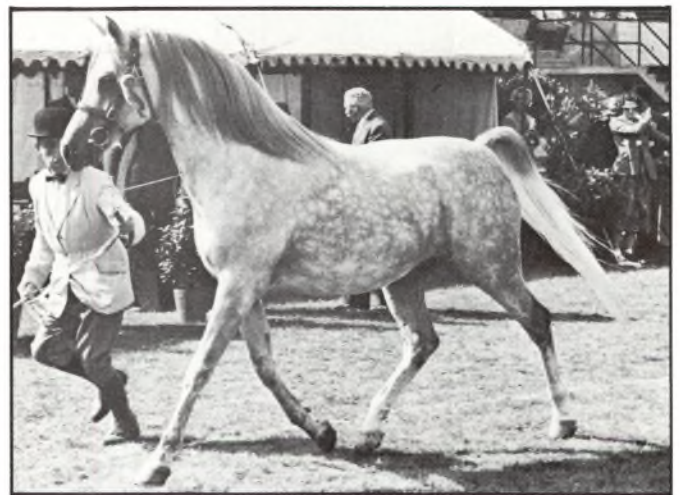
Lady Wentworth died in August of 1957. She had left the

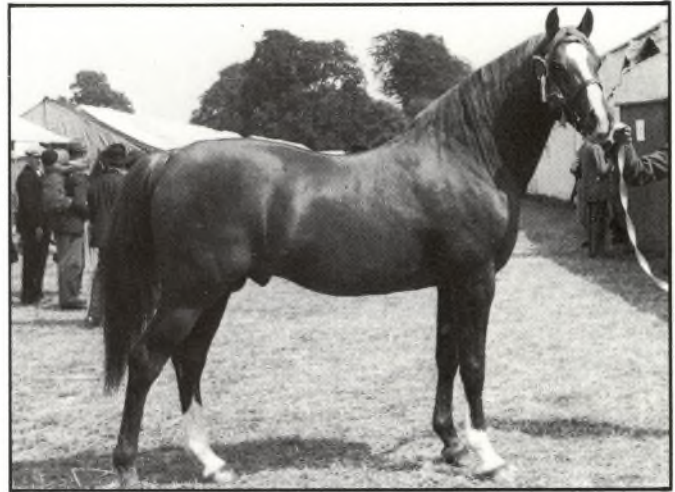

Stud to its manager, Geoffrey Covey, but as he predeceased her his son Cecil Covey became the owner of the Crabbet horses. Death duties made it necessary to reduce numbers greatly; the stud was kept up on a smaller scale and its sires made available to outside mares. Fine stock was still bred, and Bright Shadow, a horse Lady Wentworth had bought but used lightly, came into prominence. Crabbet still sent out horses of the caliber of British National Champions Hanif and Silver Sheen, and the U.S. Triple Crown action champion *Oran Van Crabbet. Outside mares produced British National Champions such as Darjeel and Haroun to the Crabbet sires. Cecil Covey kept up the stud until 1970 when highway development made it impossible to go on. Indian Magic was the last of the Crabbet Arabs to remain in Mr. Covey's ownership.

Lady Wentworth and Miss Gladys Yule died within a few weeks of each other in 1957, and neither Crabbet nor Hanstead could carry on as before. There was small demand in England for the horses, so individual animals were sold around the world. The bulk of each stud came to the United States in the 1957 Al-Marah importation. These horses may truly be said to have started the International Era of the 1960's and 70's, and we see their descendants all around us here today.

The twelve years after Cecil Covey's reduction of stock saw studs grow up which were ready to take over the last of the Crabbet stock. The horses sold in 1970 became important elements in a new context of British breeding.

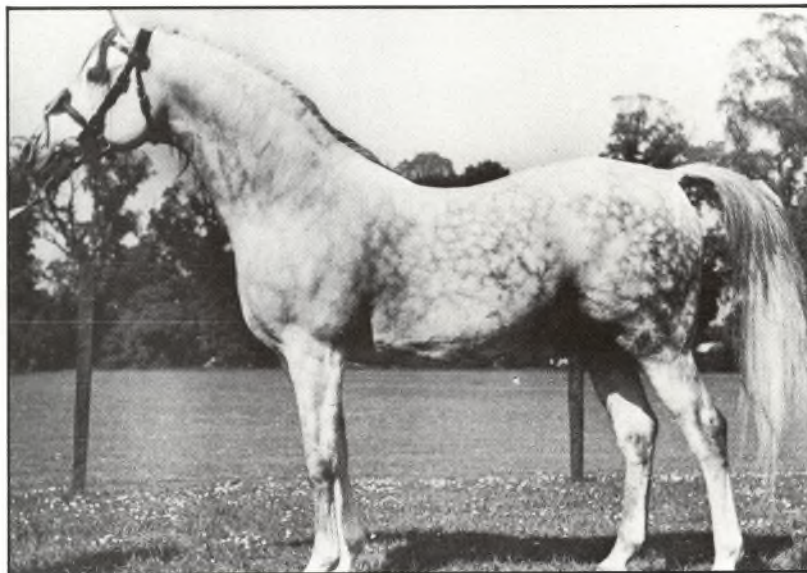
Three main branches of the Modern Crabbet legacy come to mind: one is in North America, where they can blend with a broad Crabbet base which came here before; one in Australia, where the influence of Mrs. Maclean's Fenwick Stud is particularly important; and one in England, where Crabbet, Hanstead, Courthouse and other influences combine to produce the modern English Arab.

DOUBLE R

By Mark Miller

In the early 1940's when my mother, Bazy Tankersley, began to create what became Al-Marah Arabians, there was a close association of *Raffles breeders. This association continues to this day and is quite unique. They share horses and discoveries and work closely together. Mother founded present day Al-Marah with the Selby-bred mare, Selfra, and another *Rose of France daughter, Rose of Luzon. She brought to her small broodmare band, *Raffles first son, Indraff out of the imported Crabbet mare, *Indaia. She used other Crabbet lines already prominent in the United States, most notable the close up Mesaoud blood through *Astraled and his son, Gulastra. Each of the *Raffles breeders had more in common than in differing opinions but there was a slight variation in taste. Mother cared nothing about size, always quoting the old horseman's proverb that "a good horse was a good size," but she did want a certain electric presence and especially to add to the superlative action which had made the Saddlebred trainers

at Selby Stud admire *Raffles. She liked Lady Wentworth's emphasis on shoulder with good withers and on length of neck but wanted to keep the good working rear ends which came from *Raffles and, especially, the good bone and muscling that came down from both *Raffles and *Raseyn.

When Lady Wentworth died, she was fortunate that Lady Wentworth's heir, Cecil Covey, saw fit to let her select a group of mares so that they might be kept intact and indeed added to the Crabbet stock already at Al-Marah. Typical of the close cooperation of the *Raffles breeders, her life-long friend, Dr. William Munson, went with Al-Marah's manager, Harold Brite, to select the horses at Crabbet Stud and at Hanstead. Dr. Munson at the time acquired the mare *Salinas and the stallion, *Little Owl, son of Count Dorsaz' full sister, *Kabara.

After several years of experimenting with the various Crabbet and Hanstead crosses on the Indraff blood, the Double R was born. Mother had decided that her role was

to be the preservation and intensification of the "R" line blended with Skowronek. She felt and still feels that the greatest Arabians were Mesaoud, Rodania and Skowronek. Perhaps part of their greatness lies in their interdependence with each other. But what mattered to her was that the descendents comprised the ingredients with which she wanted to work.

The modern day individuals who seemed most significant to Mother were the two Skowronek sons, *Raffles and *Raseyn and the stallion Rissalix. Because the latter was in his prime during World War II, he was not often bred and left only five breeding sons. Of these the pivotal horse was *Count Dorsaz, a horse that Bill Munson and Harold Brite had not been able to purchase but whom Mother was able to lease and subsequently to buy.

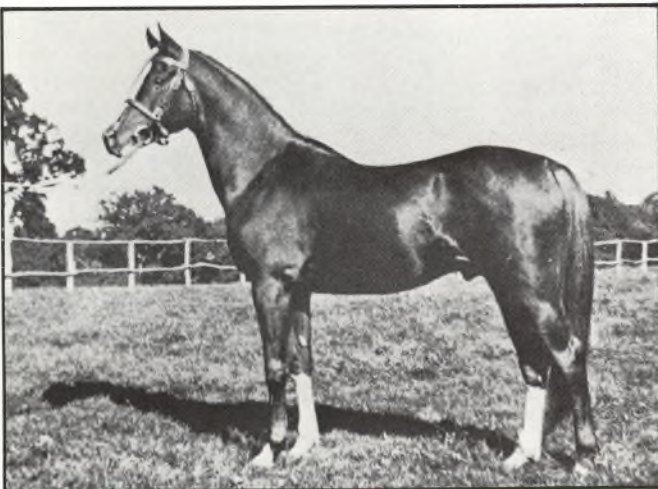
What was so interesting was that in the fifth generation Indruff and Count Dorsaz had only one individual who did not appear in both pedigrees and yet the two horses were enough different in type to compliment one another. It was probably this similarity of bloodline with the slight divergence of type which made the nick so phenomenal and, even more important, made it breed true to type in the succeeding generations.

Many neighboring breeders who had had *Raffles blood joined Mother in this program, and so she decided to form a consortium of people with similar or parallel goals and to call it DOUBLE R, meaning a blend of Rissalix blood with the blood of either *Raffles or *Raseyn. This was not to say that such programs would be limited to the descendents of these three horses but to make those horses the nucleus. Other lines to Skowronek are used, other "R" line horses valued.

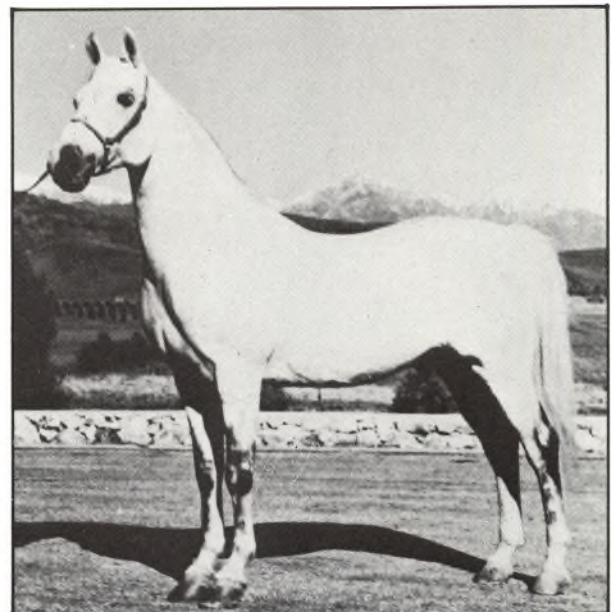
As time went on, another Rissalix stallion, *Ranix, was added and the Rissalix line-bred horse imported from Miss Greely's Well House Stud, *Royal Dominion. To make Double R breeding a viable and positive program, the Double R breeders line breed Rissalix and line breed *Raffles-*Raseyn so as to always have available the ingredients. Within the Double R Consortium, we find breeders again with some divergence of opinion, breeding horses at one end of the spectrum or the other or in between. Also there are now breeders who are taking Double R horses and using them with other Crabbet lines. The possibilities for extending Crabbet blood seem limitless and, as always when using Crabbet blood, these horses have been together for so many generations that they are homozygous for their characteristics and therefore breed predictably.



*Count Dorsaz and Bazy Tankersley at Al-Marah.



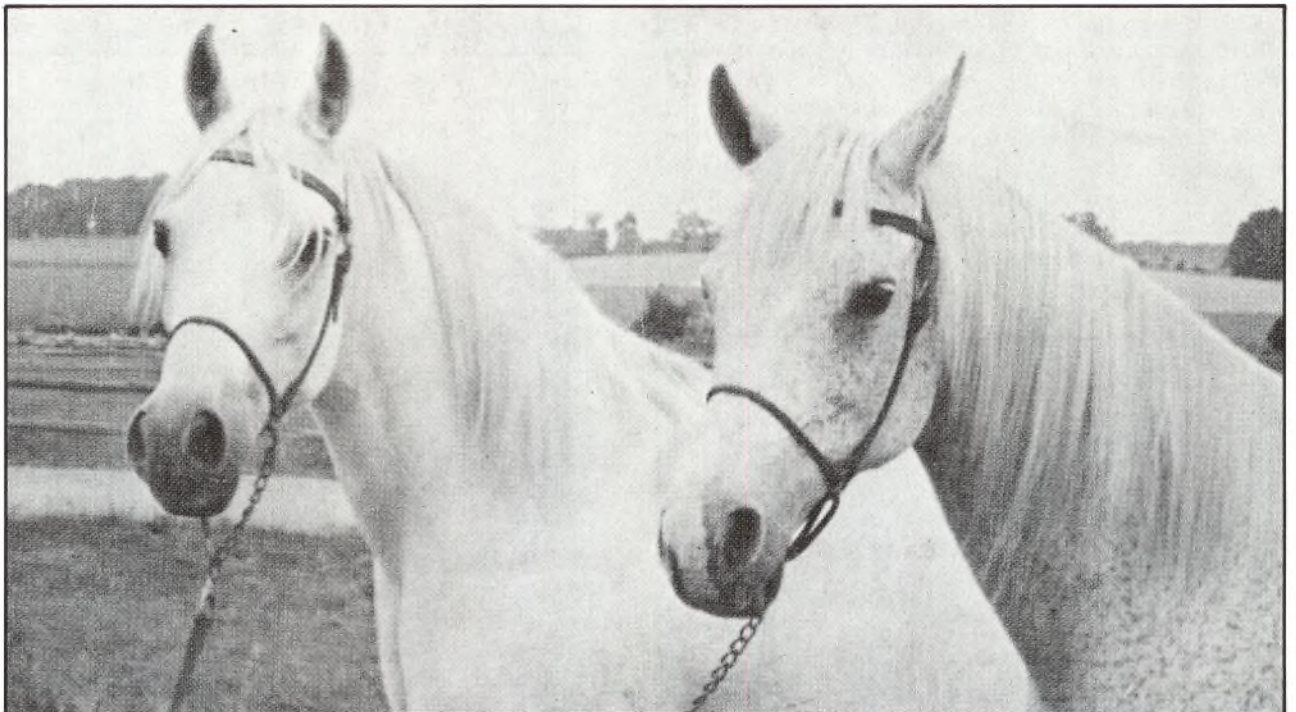

HOW THE WORLD SYMPOSIUM ON CRABBIT BREEDING'S SILENT AUCTION WORKS

Sixteen select Crabbet bred horses have been consigned to the World Symposium on Crabbet Breeding's Silent Auction. On Saturday, September 24, 1983, at noon in the stadium arena of the National Stockmen's Complex in Denver, Colorado, these 15 sale horses will be previewed. This showing will include an individual presentation at liberty. At the conclusion of the liberty presentation, the silent auction's electronic tote board will open to record bids.

At the time of registration each Symposium attendee will receive a packette of bidding cards. Signed, dated, and time of day noted, bid cards may be submitted to the auction secretary, Sam Shultz, or one of his assistants at any time between noon on Saturday and 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 25.

The bid will be recorded on the electric tote board next to the appropriate horse's lot number. Bidders will be assigned a bidding number and this number will be recorded rather than the bidder's name. In some cases, consigned horses carry a reserve bid. If this minimum bid, published, is not met, there is no sale.

The auction tote board's activity will be recorded on video monitors to be displayed in the Hall of Education and Stallion Row areas. Bid taking booths will be located in the Breeder/Commercial booth area of the Education Hall, Stallion Row and Auction Horse Stall area.

A video monitor at the main bidding booth in the Hall of Education will continuously run a film of the auction horses — showing each horse standing up, trotting out, and at liberty. The voice over will give pertinent pedigree, breeding and performance information.

At 3:00 p.m. Sunday, September 25, all auction horses will be brought to the stadium arena. The horses will be stood up individually and made available for up-close (almost hands on) inspection by the bidders. An hour will be allowed for in-depth scrutiny and subsequent bidding. Bids will be accepted during the horses' arena inspection by bid takers, easily identified by their tuxedo attire. During this period, beverages will be served. At 4:00 p.m. a bell will ring and the auction will officially close. The final recorded bid on the tote board will buy the horse. In the event of simultaneous final bids at the close, Dean Parker, a professional auctioneer, will conduct a verbal auction on the horse in question.

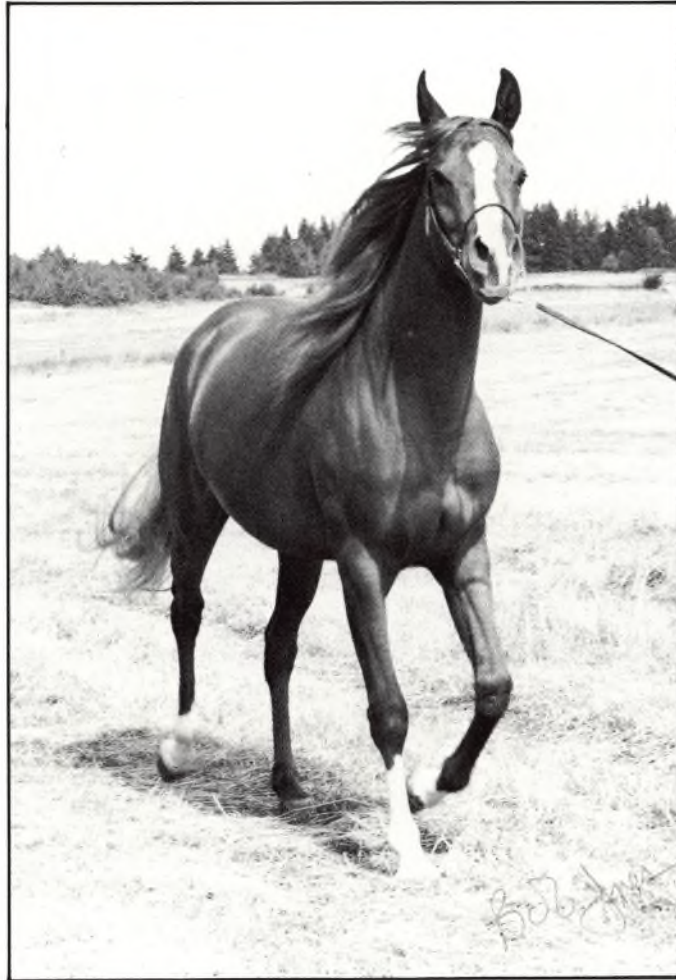
The advantages of a Silent auction are: the opportunity for the buyer and seller to talk and discuss amongst themselves the various financing arrangements acceptable to both parties, the extended viewing of the consigned horse by the potential buyer (there is ample time and opportunity to visit the horse in his stall, and talk to the owner and handlers), and the existence of identifiable written bids.

Her dam, Princess Alia, who has been only lightly shown as we do not often exhibit brood mares, has been placed well at major shows in England, including the Arab Horse Society Show at Ascot. She has already bred four prize-winning offspring and a group of her progeny have twice won the Mare Family class at the South East Region A.H.S. Show.

Princess Alia's son, Prince Saraph owned by Oasis Arabian Stud, has won championships in hand and has also been successful under saddle; he is now siring top class foals. Her three-year-old daughter, Princess Aida who belongs to the Hawkhurst Stud, has been consistently highly placed in the show-ring again this season; to date, in six outings at major shows, she has never been lower than sixth and recently won at the important South of England Show.

Princess Kibriya's granddam, Princess Troubadour, left another good line through Princess Amara. Princess Troubadour is full sister to Ludo, a very well known sire, who twice won the Supreme Riding Horse

Princess Alia's sire, Indian Flame II, won at major shows and is the sire of winners both in hand and under saddle. Amongst his progeny is a British National Champion Stallion — Silver Flame, also bred by Worth Arabian Stud — and a winner under A.H.S. Racing Rules.

The sire of Princess Kibriya, Mikeno's Pride, is a young horse and the last son of Mikeno bred by his owners Mr. and Mrs. Linney. In recent years their stud has done little showing but Mikeno is very well known as the winner of countless championships in the post war period, including the A.H.S. Show. He was particularly notable for his brilliant action and he also was the sire of horses successful in all spheres.

Pearl Maiden bred a string of show quality fillies before she produced Mikeno's Pride. She comes from another well known female line tracing to Razina, foundation mare of the Hanstead Stud, through Nurschida. Pearl Maiden's dam, Perle D'Or, was one of the most successful mares at the Well House Stud, whilst her mother, Garance, was exported to the well known Jamani Stud in South Africa. The dam of Garance, Rikitea, was one of the finest daughters of Rissalix.

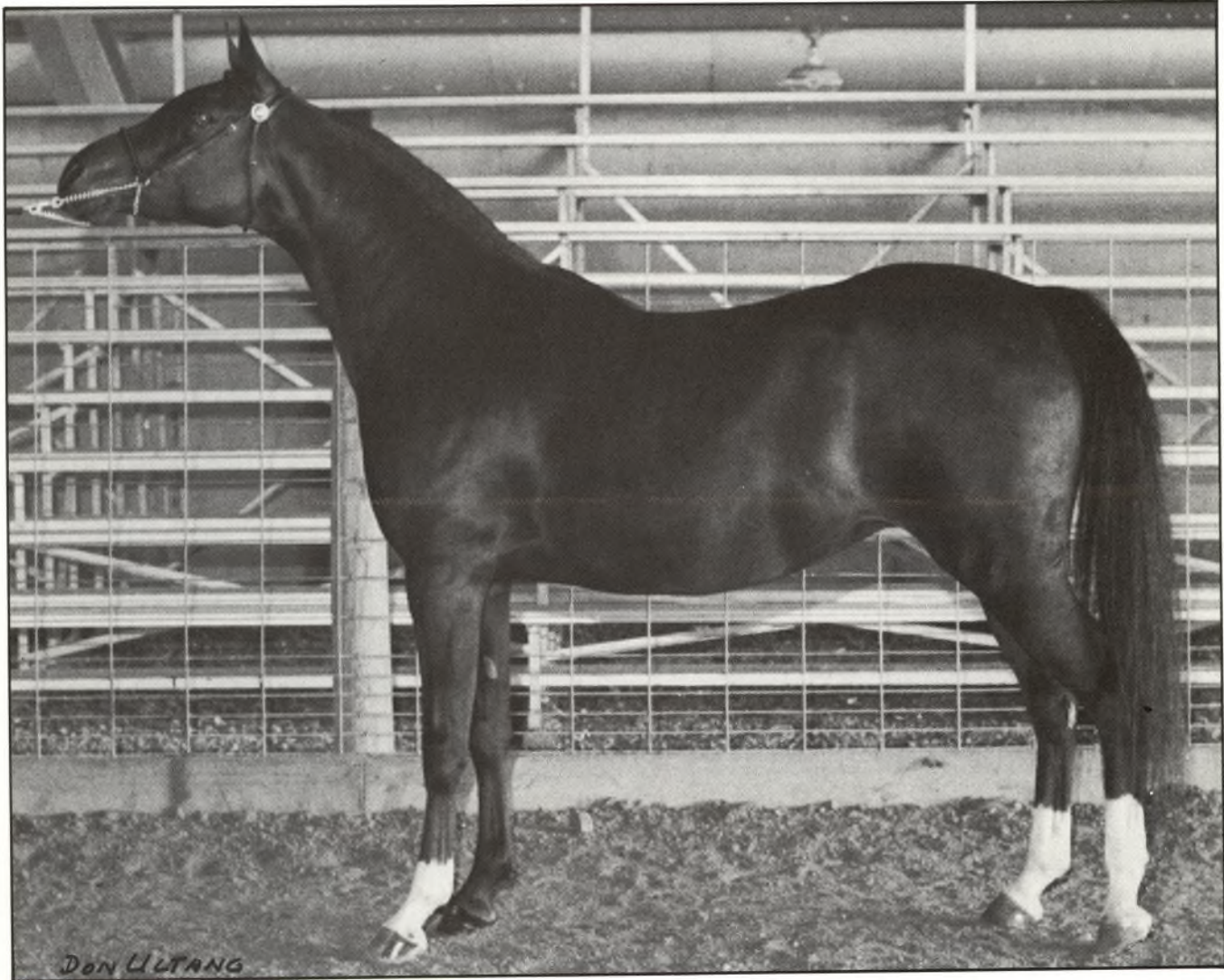

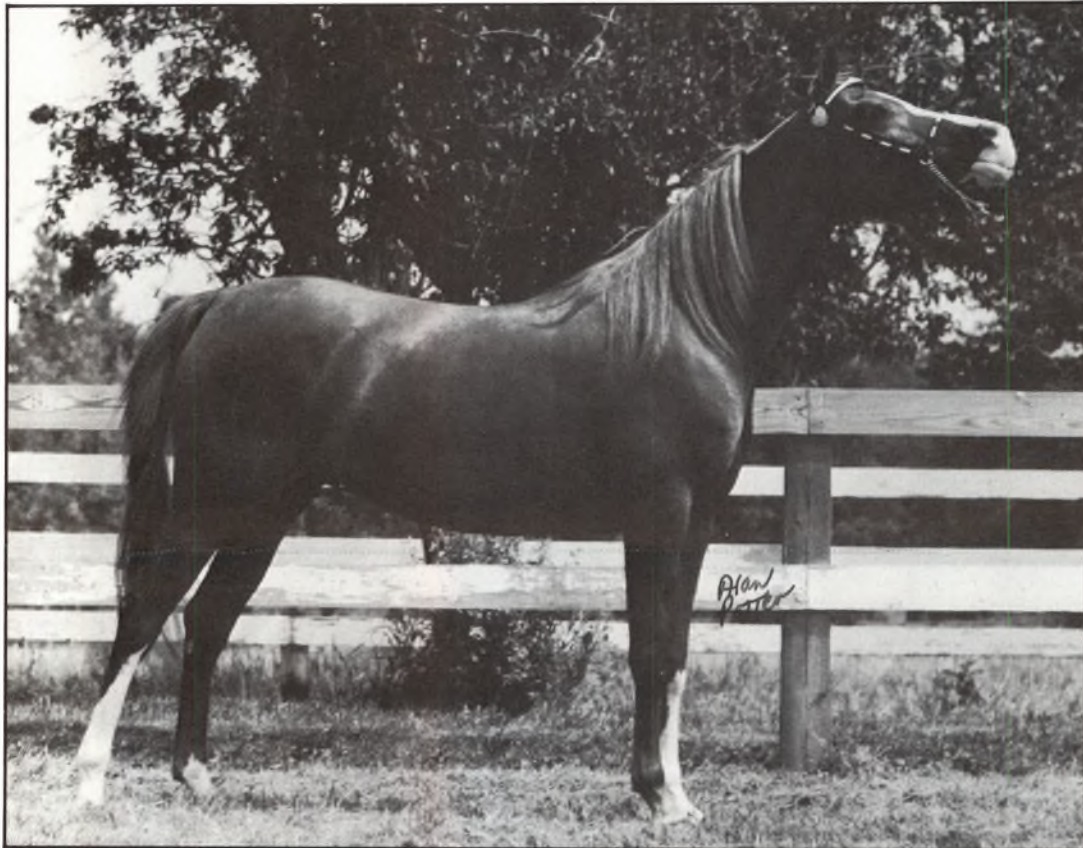

Dam: Enchanted Gold 141511, last daughter of one of the greatest breeding sons of the great Kellogg sire Abu Farwa (her sire's dam also of Kellogg breeding, combining Crabbet and desert lines). Second Dam: Mostly Magic 41732, a foundation mare of this Stud and a quality producer in the tradition of the great Nefisa family to which she is strongly linebred through Naseem and via female sources. 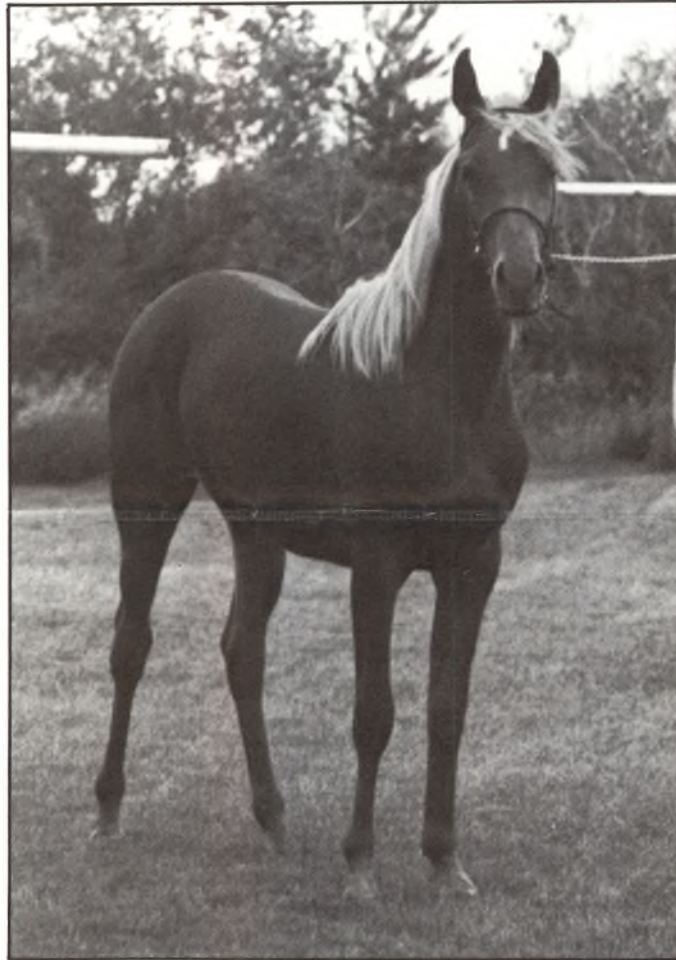

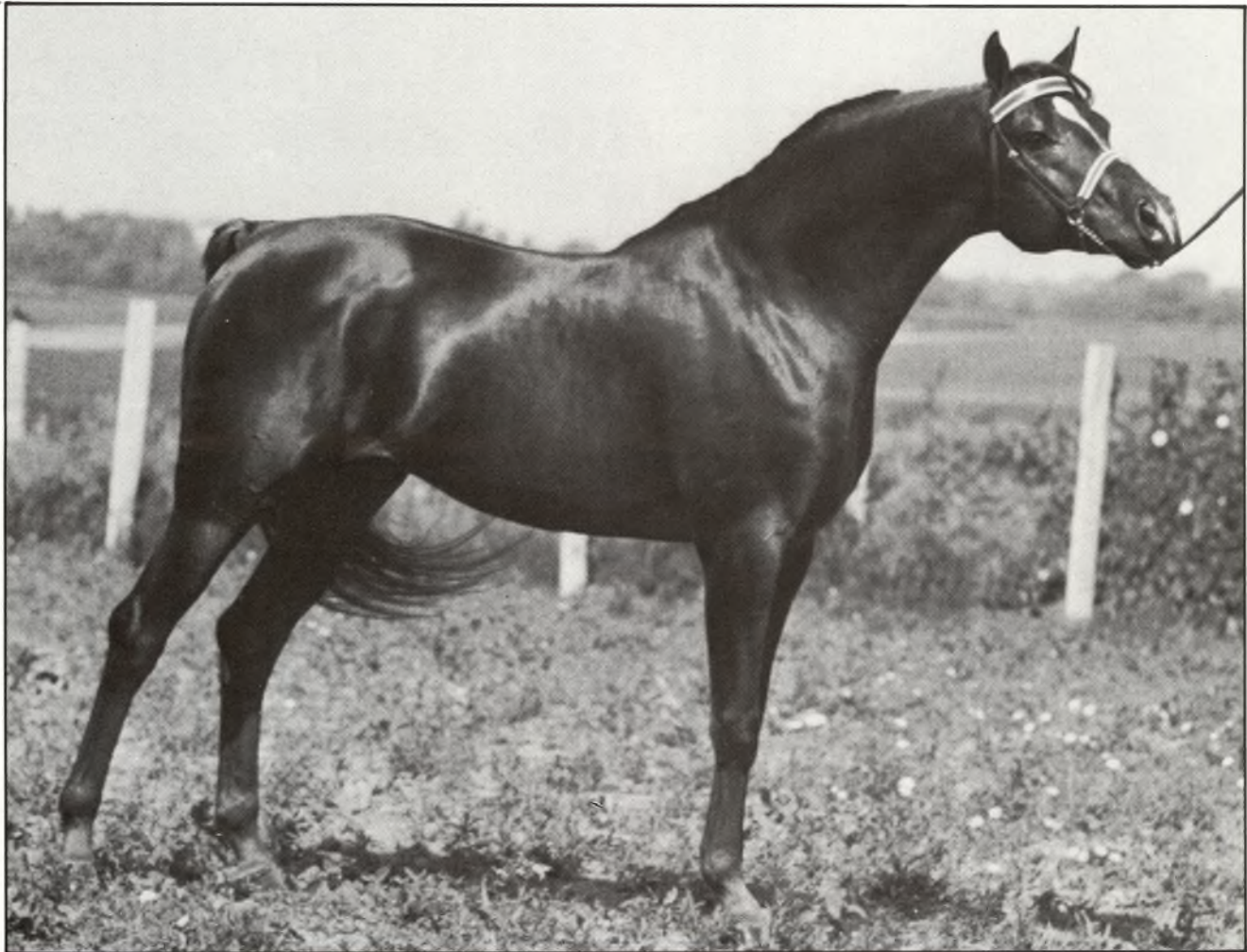

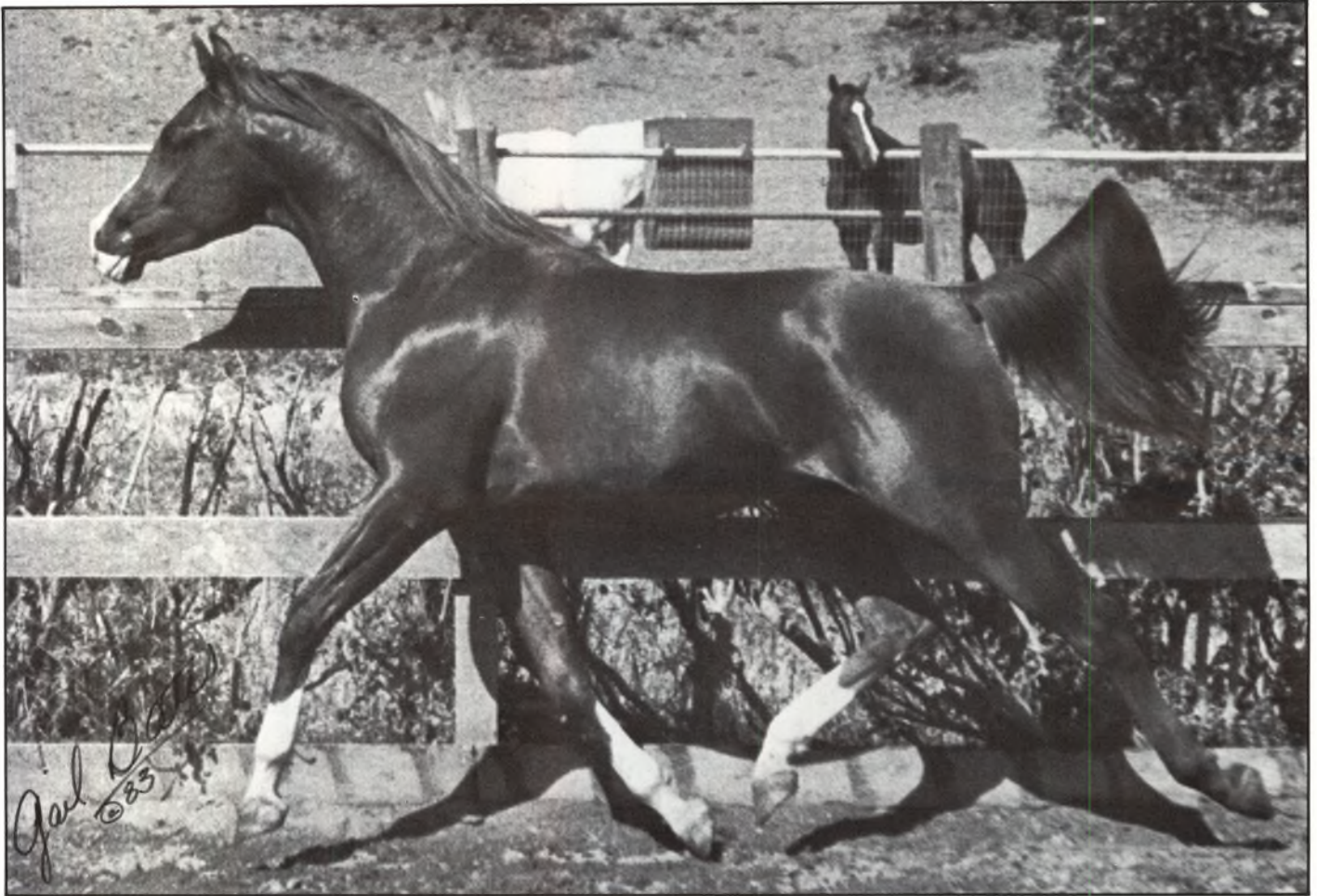

CRABBET BREEDERS' MISSION

By Bazy Tankersley

All of us are here today because of our belief in the destiny of what are known as the Crabbet Arabian horses. Destiny is the "seemingly inevitable or necessary succession of events." Certainly this word applies to these extraordinary horses. It could be said that their very excellence has been the guide to their destiny because they inspire in man, their closest companions on this planet, the passion which causes him to see that their destiny is fulfilled.

For the first thirty years of my life the greatest influence on it, next to my wonderful mother, was my godmother. She was the first person ever elected to the Board of the

Chicago Art Institute and had such knowledge and taste that she was sent by the Art Institute to buy in Europe. She cared about almost all art but mostly she loved to pour over and study the working drawings of the old masters. Once when I had written a long excited letter about what I was doing with the horses she wrote me back a characteristically short letter which said so much. I remember every word of it. It said, "Dear Bazy; I was delighted to read your letter. You have a genuine passion for Arabian horses as I have for the drawings of the old masters. It does not matter what is the object of it, what is important in life is the passion."

We here today are those fortunate people who have the God-given capacity to harbour a passion, and we are doubly blessed because the object of our passion is most wonderful and is attainable.

What makes the Crabbet Arabian horse so wonderful and why is it, in Margaret Greely's word, "important"? The Crabbet Arabian horse is many things, sometimes different things to different people. To me, for one thing, breeding Arabian horses is an art form. I cannot paint or sing or dance, but I can express my aesthetic feelings by guiding nature in the creation, hopefully, of ever more beautiful horses. It is indeed creative because each of us who breed horses have our own perception of beauty and breed to that goal. When I come upon a yearling filly where she has been running out on our mountain ranch and she stands poised in astonishment at seeing me on my saddled horse, I catch my breath and there is a feeling in my heart expressed by Wordsworth when he said, "My heart leaps up when I behold . . ." We regard each other almost as do the deer of the forest and I glory in the cleanness of her limbs, so perfectly formed, so delicate and yet so strong, the exquisite way her neck comes out from her shoulder and the way her head attaches to that neck; in the alert intelligence of her big round eyes and the brave, high set of her tail; in the strength of her loin and the budding muscles of her hip, telling me that some day soon she will carry me jauntily, happily, easily over the rocks for many miles or docily around a show ring. As if in confirmation to this thought, as I sit regarding her, she comes confidently forward. She has not seen a human being for weeks but she knows that our lives are intertwined and that someday she will be the constant companion of a human being. That is her destiny. It is my destiny to plan her future mating and to nurture her offspring. We have this destiny in common.

But our responsibility and joyful satisfaction I feel is greater than that of breeders of other horses. The Crabbet horses, as we have reaffirmed here, have an association and history totally unique in all the domestic animal kingdom. They have a tradition unrivaled. And Crabbet Arabians are the epitome of what is desirable in an Arabian horse. They not only have the most perfect and consistent beauty but theirs is the blood coursing through the veins of our most athletic horses from endurance horses to cutting horses. Crabbet horses are unrivaled in their unfailing dispositions. Think what these qualities mean to people. In this day of such great tension, the horse is perhaps more valuable than he was even when he was our main source of transportation and our means of waging war. The harmonious companionship of a good horse combined with the great variety of physical activity he can provide, make him a great source of well-being and both physical and mental health. Our Crabbet horses are, I maintain, superlative in supplying to mankind just such service because of superior intelligence and greater physical prowess. They are truly the inheritors of selection by a succession of great breeders for over a century.

Now there is a new dawn to the destiny of Crabbet horses. Mercifully the main body of these horses has never been delivered into the hands of bureaucrats in government studs, but have always been the center of the lives of people totally dedicated to their preservation and progress. There are still large private studs around the world made up predominantly of Crabbet blood. Perhaps there will always be but perhaps in the world of the future there may be no place for such studs.

We who love these horses and appreciate their great value

must not take the chance of the breaking of the chain of their being together and of being bred purely. We must broaden the base so that they will not only be preserved in perpetuity but intelligently bred. I hope that out of this great convention of dedicated people there will come a spirit of cooperation and dedication to this cause. I hope that we will come to think of all Crabbet horses as one vast herd and support each other's endeavours and exchange blood and knowledge and experience.

Every human being wants to leave something to posterity. We are heirs of Ali Pasha Sherif and the Blunts. We have the privilege of being able to pass on to future generations the priceless heritage that was ours, having devoted our lives to not just reproducing but refining and even improving. When I think of the legacy that has been mine I know that it would be the most terrible travesty if I did not do my part to help endow future generations, for there is something deep within the natures of hundreds of thousands of people that yearns for these magnificent creatures. How often have you known a child, raised totally without exposure to horses, who yearns from his earliest years for a horse? I was raised in a riding family, but I can remember my own awakening to my special feeling for horses and knew immediately that it was quite different than that of the rest of the family who rode for pleasure but that was all. It was I alone who wanted to care for my own horse and linger in the barn watching him eat even after night had fallen. When I was 11 years old, I was given a three quarter Arabian mare, and a whole world opened up for me. For the first time I experienced the thrill of being greeted by a mare glad to see me, wanting to go for a ride, reveling in my grooming ministrations, glorying in her strength as we raced across fields and even swam the river. If we rested I could lie and watch the clouds above and never fear that the little grey grazing loose would leave me. This was enough for childhood and for the teen years there were dreams, dreams, dreams and then finally the gradual fulfillment — seeing from the rim of a mountain basin one mare that even from that distance showed me the heart-skipping magic which I sought. Finally she was mine, not in the sense of possessing her because paying money to have an Arabian live at your place is still not possessing such a horse. As D. H. Lawrence said, "Say of nothing, it is mine, say only it is with me." Most especially is this true with the truly invaluable Arabian horse. My first mare was mine only in the sense that she had lived in my dreams before I ever saw her and because it was her destiny to live with someone who was born wanting her companionship. She was my legacy. She was the first mare to expose me to the delights of children with horses because I taught Girl Scouts on her during the war. A whole troop learned on that one mare and they drew lots to see which three could eat lunch on her back. She loved it. Her descendents helped teach deaf children to ride. What other horses in the world would, on their own initiative, learn the hand signals for walk, trot and stop? Their foals grew up to help found the Tucson program for handicapped children of all sorts. But that was only another facet of the legacy that was mine.

When the inevitable tragedies of life struck, it was always a horse that lead me patiently through them. What other horse will go three hours into the mountains without ever turning toward home, carrying its grieving burden enough miles to bring peace through silent communication of fellow creatures and God?

I have a 24 year old gelding who cavorted a young woman off his back recently, but there was never a cavort when he

was only nine and for five months he seemed to know I was pregnant while I was riding him. What was there in my manner of mounting and riding that made him so careful of me? I am sure a great nephew of his will carry me as carefully when I come tottering up to ride on my old age cane. Albert Harris was blind for the last several years that he daily rode to the train.

Of all people on earth Macbeth envied Banquo because Macbeth saw the vision of his descendents like mirrors showing heirs down through endless ages. Those of us raising Arabian horses are all Banquos. Because we are a fraternity of breeders of the greatest of all horses, we know

that down through the ages from dam to foal the homozygous, prepotent blood of the generations past will keep on faithfully reproducing. Let us pledge ourselves here and now, from the United Kingdom to the United States, from Canada to Australia and all in between, Crabbet breeders all over the world, to keep this most precious blood pure, to never compromise in striving to breed the best with the best so that a hundred years from now people all over the world will have the spiritual lift of an exquisite new soft muzzle touching their finger tips and the blessed release of soul that comes from riding the wind, which is riding a Crabbet Arabian horse.

Within the Arab Horse Society Margaret Greely holds an honoured position. In 1956 she was elected to the Council, in 1961 she became a Governor, between 1958-1977 she established the *A.H.S. News* as the finest breed magazine in the English horse world. For over thirty years in East Sussex her small Well House Arabian Stud, she has systematically produced stock of the highest quality. Margaret Greely, N.F.U., R.D.S., L.P.H., also qualifies as Froebel teacher, child psychologist, artist, writer and linguist.

With a French grandmother and an Irish father, a conventional approach to life was obviously unlikely, add to this a Greek grandfather and a dash of Spanish blood and unusual gifts were certain to emerge.

She was born in India, in Allahabad when her father was serving in the Irish Fusiliers. Her mother, a woman of exquisite beauty, tragically died of tuberculosis when 32 years old. She was a brilliant pianist who had studied with the renowned Tobias Matthay. Margaret also possesses the

same intense love of music. Her Greek grandfather inherited a considerable fortune but unwisely lent appreciable sums to the Tagore family. Large amounts were irretrievably lost but, fortunately, Margaret's grandmother possessed the true Gallic astuteness and the remains of the inheritance were safely invested in an estate and land in Allahabad, then just developing into the capital of the United Provinces.

Here Margaret came to live at the age of five and when her mother died was joined by her two sisters. Though memories of her parents are faint her childhood spent in Allahabad is vivid. Crystal clear is her recollection of the little white pony given as a present when she was five and which she used to ride sidesaddle, wearing a velvet habit and black toque.

The foundations of a sound and surprisingly liberal education were laid at an excellent private school run by two Scottish sisters. The pupils included Hindus, Parsees and Moslems. Here one of Margaret's friends was "Nanny" Nehru — the present Mrs. Pandit.

When she was seventeen her grandmother decided it was time for her to take on the duties of running the estate; the handling of servants, checking accounts every evening with the cook, alterations and repairs to buildings, all played their part. Margaret now asserted her independence and started to ride astride and to own horses herself. First was a half-bred Arab, Flashlight.

Margaret's grandmother most have been unique in her generation. A pretty face and social success were, in her opinion, insufficient equipment in life for any young woman so Margaret came to England to Bedford College for Froebel training taking specialised psychology at Higher Certificate level. Later, there was another two years at the Royal Drawing Society. Unfortunately it was terminated by the illness of her grandmother who died two years later.

Margaret moved to Nainital in the Himalayas lecturing there at All Saints College on kindergarten teaching. But at the end of two years she suffered a heart attack. In Allahabad a lawyer friend arranged, on rather poor terms, the sale of the family property, Margaret gave away her horses to friends, and she came to England for a long convalescence.

It was through friends in St. Leonards-on-Sea, that Margaret happened to buy The Well House near Rye and settle permanently in Sussex. As war broke out she possessed two Welsh ponies and a trap. But the Arabian predilection had never weakened and at Mr. McConnel's stud at Mayfield, Margaret fell in love with a two year old grey filly of Lady Yule's breeding, for which she impulsively swapped pony, trap and harness, and became the owner of her first pure-bred Arabian. It was a sad experience, the filly died, a replacement in wartime was almost impossible.

Margaret relates, with gratitude and affection, Lady Yule let her have the choice mare, Quaker Girl, but again there was disappointment for she proved at that time infertile. As a companion, however, Margaret had bought from Mr. McConnell the yearling Shamal (Fayal/Rizada) later to be sent to Irex by whom she had two daughters; one Scherazade to make history in Australia. Thus the Well House Stud was modestly established.

But the Fates were not kind. At the 1950 A.H.S. Show at Roehampton Margaret fell when her filly Mirvaneh shied on entering the ring. Dreadful injuries to skull and face, including a broken nose and grave damage to an eye were incurred. Quaker Girl was regretfully sold to Australia and kind friends took over the young stock. Eventually when Margaret was able to restart her stud it was again Lady Yule who tried to fulfill the dream of owning a grey Arabian with Garance described by Margaret as 'a plainish filly but beautifully bred and a desert type like the horses I had in India.' Over the years this small stud was to make considerable impact with such mares as Teresita and Perle D'Or. From Scherazade, who had been bought unseen by the Blighs of the Bostock Stud in Queensland, descended the wonderful Ralvon Pilgrim, awarded the final International Championship at the 1977 A.H.S. Show at Ascot.

Enforced inactivity after the accident started Margaret writing animal stories for the B.B.C. In 1952 there were children whose lives and education had been disrupted by the war and had suffered nervous tension. Four such children of personal friends came to her for professional teaching. Eventually thirty pupils took over the house. Margaret's methods achieved extraordinary success. Children from families both distinguished and ordinary today owe their present stability and happiness to her skill and understanding.

Until 1959 Margaret ran both the school and the stud, also edited the A.H.S. Magazine (in itself almost a fulltime occupation). In the interim she was also working on her book Arabian Exodus on the history of the Arabian horse, published in 1975 and now in its second edition. She is on the Judges Panel and has judged also in the United States and South Africa. In the States she has been appointed a Trustee of the Arabian Horse Owners Foundation. But I have also on many occasions suddenly found Margaret missing. For with little warning she becomes airborne on her way to such places as Bahrien, Jordan, or Quatar. Rulers of the Near East countries require unbiased assessment of their Arabian stock from someone who not only understands conformation and type but who also has an intimate knowledge of blood lines. Well — there are quite a few such experts in the Society but who except Margaret Greely could discuss these points in fluent Arabic?

Bazy and AM Canadian Beau

BAZY TANKERSLEY

Bazy — energetic, fiery, determined, practical, knowledgeable, given to listening more than to talking; thoughtful, generous, fun-loving — complex. She does not fit any categories. To pigeon-hole Bazy is not to know her.

Born into a prominent American political and newspaper family, Bazy excelled in all that one might expect from such a background — a woman holding executive positions in an era prior to the present time which lauds the achievements of women in leadership. *Who's Who In America* cites some of her accomplishments and honors: Board positions on the *Chicago Tribune* and *Washington Times-Herald*. A writer herself, (she preferred writing to publishing) Bazy wrote a weekly column for the *Tribune* for many years. Bazy's political interests were perhaps more directed toward issues of national health and humanitarian concerns. She served on the board of the National Health Council and was president of the National Epilepsy League. We find that Bazy has for some years been a cattle breeder of note, holding positions with both state and national cattle associations.

Above all, Bazy is a woman who followed where her passion led her. When Life's passion is discovered — and perhaps this happens all too rarely — Life's genius will be found there as well. This passion was kindled early in Bazy who came from a riding family. However her love and regard for horses was unique.

Owning a part-Arabian mare in 1934 soon led to the acquisition of the Selby-bred *Selfra*, a daughter of **Rose of France* who figures strongly in the Al-Marah breeding program today. Shortly thereafter the **Raffles* son, *Indraff* was acquired. By 1942 Al-Marah sprang into being.

A middle-sized breeder in those days who already included in her mare band such fabulous horses as *Rose Marie*, also by **Raffles*, *Destiny* took Bazy by the hand when R. B. Fields of Washington State requested that she take his group of Arabians. These included *Rapture* by **Raffles* and the *Gulastra* daughter, *Mlecha*, among others, doubling the size of her herd. 1957 brought yet another milestone to the history of Al-Marah and to the Breed in America — the importation of horses from the *Crabbet* and *Hanstead Stud*s upon the deaths of *Lady's Wentworth* and *Yule*. This was the largest importation from England to that time.

Over forty years, Al-Marah's breeding program has both evolved and remained constant. With the addition of *Rissalix* breeding, spearheaded by the importation of **Count Dorsaz*, to the well-established foundation of **Raffles*, the Double "R" program was conceived. That Al-Marah's breeding program has neither stood still nor abandoned the basic breeding and standards upon which it was founded, is perhaps a reflection of Bazy's own personage.

Impressive credentials, lists of achievements do much to color our views of a person — our ideas of *who* a person is. Yet, I wonder if, of all the standards by which we judge others — and ourselves — we lack the basic insights which our beloved Arabians seem to possess as they regard us. Does it not seem these most perceptive of God's creatures sense the character — the substance of a person and react accordingly? Walking with Bazy in the broodmare pasture, among her mares and their foals, one cannot help but be moved by the regard and affection they hold for her.
